Our Plain Duty.

At last we are facing war, and there
seems no honorable way in which it can
be avoided. We, therefore, must fight.

But the conflict a reality, it will be
well if we as a people are disposed to
profit by the experience of the nations
across the water.

It seems like a prosaic matter for dis-
cussion, but really one of the greatest
factors that will enter into the matter is
our food supply. We are already faced
with prices as high as it would seem we
can possibly endure: with a pronounced
shortage in many lines of products; and
if a large army and navy is to be re-
cruited from our industrial workers the
situation is likely to become serious.

It is, however, fortunate that the cri-
sis should come at this season of the
year, when the people can plan to meet
the situation. The farming season is
just opening, and every man, woman
and child in the United States should be
brought to feel that on his or her shoulders
rests a very tangible portion of the
responsibility that faces the nation.

OUR PEOPLE MUST BE FED. In
an ordinary year this matter would au-
tomatically take care of itself. But not
so in this instance. Aside from the fact
that thousands and thousands will be
drawn from the ranks of the workers,
we will have also to reckon with the
ranks of the workers, we will have also
to reckon with the restlessness and ex-
citement that will inevitably prevail
throughout the country. This is not
conducive to successful work.

What our people must realize is that
no calamity can be allowed to touch us
AS A WHOLE. An army may be mobi-
lized, and the navy strengthened, but
affairs will move along in the same
grooves in all lines of industry. Hence,
with the increased demand for food sup-
plies that is sure to come, the FIRST
THOUGHT of ALL the people should
be to see that every available foot of
tillable soil is made to produce a crop.

And this should not only apply to
farmers. Millions of people in the cit-
ies and towns can contribute largely to
the result. Unused back yards, vacant
lots, fallow fields, even railroad rights
of way can be made to add their quota.
Every dweller in a city or town who can
by any means secure a plot of ground
should do so and devote a portion of his
or her time this season to producing
something to eat. None should evade
this duty, for a DUTY it is.

Let none delude themselves with the
belief that there will be any material
lowering of the prices of foodstuffs un-
less there is an INCREASE IN PRO-
DUCTION. The demand is too great.
There are yawning markets the world
over for every bushel of wheat, corn, po-
tatoes, or any other article of food that
we can produce, and even should we
escape a long war, at least as long as
the conflict continues in Europe that
demand will be urgent.

We can, we should, we MUST make
of ourselves that which we glory in pro-
claiming—a nation of farmers.

It is the patriotic duty of every man,
woman and child in this community to
plant every available foot of tillable land,
that we may be self supporting and have
a surplus to export.

There are many vacant lots in Sandy
that we are sure can be obtained merely
for the asking, for farming purposes, and
we would like to see every one of these
in crop this year.

We think it is the patriotic duty of
our Commercial Club to take this mat-
ter up at once, and assist in every pos-
sible manner in increasing the acreage in
crops in this community.

Who can say that the man who farms
is not doing a real service to his country
in these days of crop shortage the world
over.

This paper is willing to assist any or-

this community, in any manner possible.

Silage Keeps Two Years.

Referring to silage carried over from
one year to another, M. N. Nathaniel
of Henderson county, Ill., reports in
the Drovers' Telegram that he had
silage left in the spring of 1914 which
he fed out in the early months of 1916.
The only waste was a thin crust on
top. "The silage was just as good as
though it had been put in a few months
previously," he said. "This is one of
the great advantages of this feed."

AROUND THE DAIRY.

Fear, cold, any kind of discom-
fort, is expensive in a dairy
herd. Comfort always means
profit. It is up to you if your
cows do not turn you a profit.
Never mix warm and cold
cream or sweet and slightly
tainted cream.
Wooden pails should not be
used for milking, as they easily
become sour and cannot be thor-
oughly cleansed.
No loud talking should be per-
mitted in the stable, and it is
best that the cows be milked by
the same persons in the same or-
der at each milking.
Regularity in milking aids in
developing a tendency to prolong
the period of lactation.
