AS THE EDITOR SEES IT.

Now that we have taken the plunge,
there is but one thing for a loyal citizen
of this country to do—stand firmly by
his country, whether it be native or
adopted. The man who does otherwise
is not true either to himself or to the
land that shelters, feeds and clothes
him.

There were many who honestly
thought we should not go to war with
Germany. But the great majority of
American people thought otherwise.
So did the president and the congress.

Each was clearly entitled to his indi-
vidual opinion until such time as the
matter was definitely settled one way or
the other.

But with war actually in existence,
with our armies hurrying into the field,
with our navy making preparations to
sweep the seas, with our young men
rushing to the colors, there can be but
one path for us to tread—absolute loyal-
ty to our country.

Whatever our beliefs may have been
in the past, our country now is at war,
and we must support it with our every
drop of blood and our every dollar of
wealth.

Those who think that it will be sim-
ply a bluff at war—merely the assembling
of an army that will drill for a few
months and then go home—will be woe-
fully mistaken.

The United States has been both loath
and slow to draw the sword but once
drawn it will never be sheathed until
victory is complete and our enemy is no
longer able to do us harm.

INCREASE OUR CROP PRO- DUCTION.

It will be particularly important to
produce as much as possible of the crops
which may be used for food, and which
can readily be transported to the places
where food is needed, it is also impor-
tant for us to produce a liberal quantity
of the material which may be fed to live-
stock.

Field beans will be planted very ex-
tensively on many lands of Western
Oregon, we believe them to be a good
crop to grow as they are a particularly
concentrated type of food. It is not
likely that we will seriously overproduce
on beans and therefore recommend this
crop for extended culture.

The Lady Washington is a particular-

ly good variety. They may be grown
to advantage on the sandy loamy soils or
the somewhat heavier types, provided
the land is warm and well drained.

WHEAT is the CROP that should be
grown on every acre of land that is cap-
able of reasonable good production, of
the spring varieties of wheat for the
mellow lands, we call your particular
attention to Defiance and on the some-
what heavier lands would call attention
to the Red Houston, the Marquis, the
Red Fife and the Minnesota Wonder
which are generally produced in a num-
ber of sections of Western Oregon. At
this late in the season we recommend
that 8 pecks per acre should be sown.

Of course it should be given the for-
malin treatment consisting of one pound
of formalin to 45 gallons of water and
either sprinkling the wheat after thor-
ough cleaning and then leaving covered
over night or dipping the wheat for 30
minutes in the solution and skimming off
all floating particles. After treatment
the wheat should be spread out and
shoveled over so that the formalin may
get away from it without injury to the
germination.

Barley is a small grain crop that
outyields any other of the small grains
in Western Oregon. The Hannchen
variety has been the highest yielding
barley of the best quality in many sec-
tion. Barley should be seeded as soon
as possible at two bushels per acre,
although if seeding is delayed until very
late, barley can be seeded late to better
advantage than any other one of the
small cereals.

Oat is a valuable crop on the lands
that are rather cold and damp and will
produce more grain under such condi-
tions than any other of the small
grains. It should be seeded at 2½ to 3
bushels per acre as soon as possible.
The Three-Grain, Victory, Shadeland,
Climax and Banner are all very good
varieties for grain production.

For hay production, oats also is a
good crop and should be planted exten-
sively for that purpose this year. The
oats for hay should be planted from 3
4 bushels per acre and the shadeland
wonder, the Shadeland Eclipse and the
victory are all very good varieties for
this purpose.

For stock feeding purposes, especial-
ly hogs, an early maturing variety of
corn is very good. We recommend es-
pecially the Minnesota No. 23 which
produces a well matured type of corn
each year. Seed of it is available in
various places and it is a highly pro-
ductive type for hog feeding purposes.

Other varieties, such as Minnesota
No. 13, Golden Glow, Oregon Dent,
Pride of the North should be grown ex-
tensively for silage purposes. It is
probable that we will face another year
of high-priced feed for stock.

Dwarf Essex rape is a splendid hog
pasture plant for midsummer.

For very late planting, buckwheat
makes a very good grain for feeding
purposes as well as for milling purposes,
turnips sown late provide an abundance
of both stock and human food.

Stand by your country, and do your
duty by planting every available acre
in crop this year.

How many American flags are float-
ing to the breeze in this to vn? There
should be more. They should be shown
in every home. They should float from
every building. They should be in evi-
dence everywhere. It is not seemly
that we go about the streets shoving
our Americanism into every ear, but it
is proper and right that we show our

TAXES WILL NOT BE INCREASED

Revenue Provided for Interest
and Principal on Road
Bonds.

Opponents of the road bond bill
contend that the proposed bond issue
will become an added burden to the
general taxpayer. As a complete an-
swer and refutation of this argument,
the Legislative Good Roads Commit-
tee has incorporated the following
statement as a part of its argument
in support of the bond bill which will
be published in the official state pam-
phlet:

"We have ascertained from the rec-
ords of the office of the Secretary of
State that the income from the pres-
ent quarter-mill tax is \$220,000 per
annum; that the income from auto li-
censes, based upon the present num-
ber of automobiles at the increased
license rate effective August 1st, will
be not less than \$310,000 per annum
to be used in paying interest and prin-
cipal of bonds. The above funds will
be sufficient not only to pay the in-
terest and the principal of the \$6,000-
000 bonds authorized by this act, but
will also pay the interest and prin-
cipal of the \$1,819,280.55 in bonds author-
ized to meet the government road ap-
propriation. After paying these bonds
there will be a surplus of at least \$2-
793,402.66. Since 1911 the increase in
the number of automobiles in the
State of Oregon has been 33½ per
cent per year. With the completion
of good roads this increase will natu-
rally be larger. However, we have not
taken any increase into account but
have based our figures on the present
number of automobiles."
