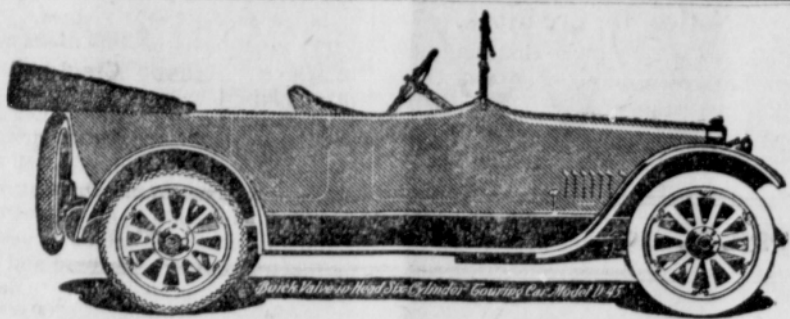

BREEDING FOR EGGS.

Select Cockerels That Are Always Ready to Fight, Says English Expert.

The best cockerels for breeding layers are the ones that fight without provocation, says Tom Barron, the noted English poultry breeder. It takes physical strength for a hen weighing but four pounds to produce a two ounce egg a day for 200 or 225 days a year. He also will tell you that the source of strength for this tremendous task lies in the fighting cockerel, with which the mother of the hen is mated. The mother furnishes the habit and the father the stamina. The combination furnishes double the amount of eggs in twelve months that come from the ordinary hit or miss method.

Such fine physical power is an absolute essential, again, when an attempt is made to push egg production to unusual limits. It takes superior endurance for a hen to lay eggs more than 200 days a year. The fighting cockerel again furnishes the power of endurance demanded. The breeder of laying hens is well on the way to exceptional success, according to Barron, when he is raising fighting cockerels from eggs laid by big egg producing hens and breeding these cockerels with hens from an entirely different strain of heavy egg producers.
