Per Man, Not Per Acre.

We hear much about increased pro-
duction and conserving idle lands; much
of utilizing back yards and vacant lots,
even roadsides and rights of way. Ad-
ded to this will be the annual prize con-
tests for the greatest yields per acre.
They are all good—excellent.

But let us not lose sight of the fact
if this country is to meet and solve the
food problem the burning demand will
be not for the maximum production
per acre, but for the maximum PER
MAN.

It is imperative that every worker in
the soil this year use every means possi-
ble to make his work count to the ut-
most in his VOLUME OF PRODUCE-
TION. He should cultivate every acre
possible, and in order to increase his
capacity he should employ every avail-
able implement for reducing man labor
while increasing the work done.

This is no time to be dabbling in a
garden with a weeding hoe while a trac-
tor and gang plow stand idle. The gar-
den and back yard are available for the
aged and very young and the town busi-
ness man who has no field to cultivate,
but the husky young giant is vitally
needed in driving the BIG implements
of production and making the broad
acres bloom and fruitify.

A full yield per acre is essential but
salvation of this country will depend
largely upon BETTER YIELDS and
MORE ACRES PER MAN.

Last year millions of acres went un-
cultivated. This year every acre should
be made to produce the limit of its
possibilities. An idle field in 1917 will
be a reproach to its owner, and it is to
be hoped there will be not one in this
whole community.

If the owner is without the means of
securing improved machinery in order
to increase his acreage and its yield,
then the moneyed men and the bankers
should come promptly to his aid. The
financier is indebted to this country for
his wealth, and in the hour of national
danger that wealth should be placed un-
reservedly at the legitimate disposal of
the farmers who must toil early and
late that the people may not suffer for
bread.

The big implement makers should al-
so come to the front with a rush. If
credit is needed, then credit should be
extended in order that more acres may
be tilled.

Where more farm hands are needed

they should be drafted from the cities
and towns. If they are unwilling to go
and do their share governmental authori-
ties should compel action. Every able
bodied man should either fight or work.
There is no room for slackers and the
public is in no mood to condone them.

The United States does not lack for
the MEANS to produce the crops neces-
sary to feed the people in this hour of
peril, but those means MUST BE EM-
PLOYED or we fall.

Age of Breeding Roosters.

Always breed from mature stock; full
development is essential. Many breed-
ers prefer to use a four-year-old male
in robust health rather than an imma-
ture or undersize young bird. A male's
value is really twofold, remember; he
must produce fertility and he must
transmit his own desirable qualities.
As a general rule two or three years is
the limit of profitable usefulness of
fowls as they are bred today.

Remove Spurs From Old Males.

Spurs on old males very often be-
come quite a problem. It is a great
mistake to allow them to grow so long.
Better dehorn them; it is a compara-
tively simple operation. Use a fine
saw, preferably a hack saw, and cut off
the spurs within a half inch of the leg,
never closer than this. Heat a knife
blade until red hot and cauterize the
ends to check any flow of blood and to
prevent infection.

Insure Oats Against Smut.

Last season the value of the oats
crop was increased over \$20,000
through the larger yield due to the
treatment of seed oats for smut in six
Ohio counties. Smut may or may not
cause a big loss to the oats crop this
year. However, it costs but a few
cents an acre, including time and ma-
terials, to treat the seed with formalin.
Many farmers recognize this practice
as cheap insurance. Detailed informa-
tion concerning the treatment of oats
for smut may be had from the Agricul-
tural college extension service, Colum-
bus, O.
