Living at Home.

One phase of the food question that
will have a big influence is that of trans-
portation. We are already experiencing
a serious car shortage, and in case a
large army is mobilized this summer
conditions have a small chance for im-
provement.

Now the people themselves can in a
large measure remedy this matter.
This can be done by a substantial effort
all over the country to feed all of the
people from their own soil and produce
a surplus besides. The surplus would be
used by the army or shipped to our
allies abroad.

Every state, every county, even every
neighborhood should organize its forces
so that as nearly as possible ALL FOOD
consumed in any section shall be pro-
duced IN that section.

For instance: A certain section of
country has never heretofore raised
sufficient potatoes for home consumption.
It should be the aim of that section to
raise every bushel needed for home
consumption, and if possible some to
spare.

The same might be said of small fruits,
garden produce, even corn itself. The
great consideration is to have the stuff
itself on the ground where it is needed
for consumption.

This would release large numbers of
cars for use in transporting the army
and its supplies.

You can not show your loyalty in any
better way than by straining every nerve
to make yourself independent of any
man in the matter of food.

About the greatest commendation
that can be given any man this year
will be the familiar old phrase, "he
lives at home."

UP TO US TO WIN.

About the only danger that could
threaten the success of our arms in the
war upon which this country is launched
would be a minimizing of the impor-
tance of the work before us.

After almost three years of war, after
pouring out blood and treasure until
nearly bankrupt in both, the allied
nations yet seem almost as far from
victory as at the beginning. Their
leaders admit the terrible destruction

crush out all opposition.

and decisive. We must prove ourselves
AMERICANS, and not slackers.

WILL TOUR STATE FOR GOOD ROADS

Highway Commissioners Will
Make Numerous Addresses
Before Election.

During the week of May 21-26, in-
clusive, Highway Commissioners Ben-
son and Adams will speak on the
\$6,000,000 good roads bond bill in a
number of cities in the Willamette
Valley. A separate itinerary has
been arranged for each. Mr. Benson
will be accompanied by Jay Bower-
man and another speaker will prob-
ably accompany Mr. Adams. During
the same week W. L. Thompson, the
third member of the Highway Com-
mission, accompanied by James
Stewart, of Fossil, will make a trip
through Central Oregon, including
Klamath Falls and Lakeview. His
itinerary is being arranged.

Mr. Benson and Mr. Bowerman
will make a tour of the east side of
the Willamette Valley and will ad-
dress meetings as follows:

Following his Newberg meeting,
Mr. Adams will leave for a whirlwind
trip through Gilliam and Wheeler
counties, being scheduled for three
meetings in the two counties on Sat-
urday, May 26. He will speak at
Arlington in the morning, Condon in
the afternoon and conclude the day
with a night meeting at Fossil.

Mr. Adams will conclude the cam-
paign with a meeting at Oregon City
probably on the night of June 1, with
a final meeting in Eugene, his home
town, Saturday night, June 2.

THE AMERICAN ROAD— 1917 DEFINITION

A strip of unowned land over which
anybody is free to walk, ride or drive

Oregon roads are no exception.

In their campaign of misrepresen-
tation of facts, opponents of the \$6-
000,000 road bond bill are making the
baseless charge that it will cost the
various counties not less than \$10,000
a mile to prepare roads for hard-sur-
facing by the state; that for this reason
few counties under the 6 per cent
limitation can afford this expense and
consequently will not be in a position
to obtain paving under the pro-
visions of the road bond bill. The
actual experience of different coun-
ties in the state disproves this con-
tention of the road bond opponents.
Morrow County is completing the
grading and draining of a stretch of
18 miles of road from Lone to Hepp-
ner. The cost for the work for the
greater part of that mileage was \$150
a mile. The very most expensive
sections of the road did not cost to
exceed \$5000 a mile. Under the rul-
ing of the Highway Commission it
will only be necessary for counties
to grade and drain the road. The
state will lay the crushed rock base
and the paving.
