An interesting Letter.

Today I received a copy of the Sandy News and it seemed like a visit home and I don't think I overlooked a line or have enjoyed anything more, since I left home.

Right here while I am speaking of reading matter, will say if any of my Sandy friends or any one who wants to help the cause, has any books they are not particular about keeping they would be greatly appreciated. There are one hundred and fifty men on our floor and they have many hours to devote to reading.

We are not allowed any liberty only from four thirty Saturday afternoon until eleven thirty Sunday evening. The rest of the time we are expected to be in bed by ten, when taps is blown and all lights are out. We are called about six every morning and must roll out and hustle into our clothes. We line up for roll call about 6.15 and are marched out to the drill ground, usually at the double quick and given calisthenics exercises for about twenty minutes. We march back to quarters and get busy cleaning up and cleaning up the quarters. Some few of us get ambitious and roll out before call and have a shower and shave.

Our mattresses have to be folded and our blankets and sheets folded on top and around the top fold of the mattress. We sweep every morning, and scrub the floor twice a week and windows once a week. We are supposed to take at least two baths a week and when a fellow comes in here and tries to get by with less, he is taken down on the beach and scrubbed with sand and salt water, once usually cures them.

Uncle Sam starts us out with four suits of underwear, four pair of socks and two suits of kaki service uniforms. We are not allowed to send anything to the laundry while here but must wash and take care of them ourselves.

It is really amazing to see how many fellows, that never did anything in that line, develop into first class washwomen and seamstresses.

The training certainly makes a man self-reliant and fits him for taking care of himself under adverse circumstances, which is a marines job. Believe me after a few call downs from the officers a man is very particular to have all of his buttons on, everything buttoned up; no strings, handkerchiefs etc. hanging out of his pockets; his shoes shined and his clothing clean, especially on Monday which is inspection day. The officers seem to see everything.

After breakfast go out for an hour of drilling or calisthenics and then come in and finish cleaning up and stand by for inspection of quarters and then we are taken out for some more drill. Then dinner and more drill until about four, when we are through for the day.

After supper some go to the gymnasium, where they usually get up a boxing or wrestling match until about 8 o'clock when the gymnasium is used for a movie show. As there is no room in it for every one here, certain nights are for certain companies and there is a show every night but Sat. and Sun. My company has Friday night. We are all usually in our quarters by 9 o'clock and put in the time writing and reading.

Every one who wishes are training for a big field meet we are going to hold the fourth. We have several hundred dollars in prizes and some good athletes, so expect an interesting day.

This is certainly great training and it is surprising how they trim you down. I have lost my stomach and am almost as flat as a board in that region. There are several Sandy citizens that it would benefit in that line.

We are furnished good food and plenty of it. Of course we don't have the home nick-knacks that we have been accustomed to but we haven't much to complain of.

It is surprising how much like a lot of kids we all get and as soon as we get out strike for ice-cream, candy and fruit. Wish I had some of the good Oregon strawberries. I suppose they are plentiful out there now.

I will write again after the fourth and let you know if we establish any new records. Best wishes to everybody.

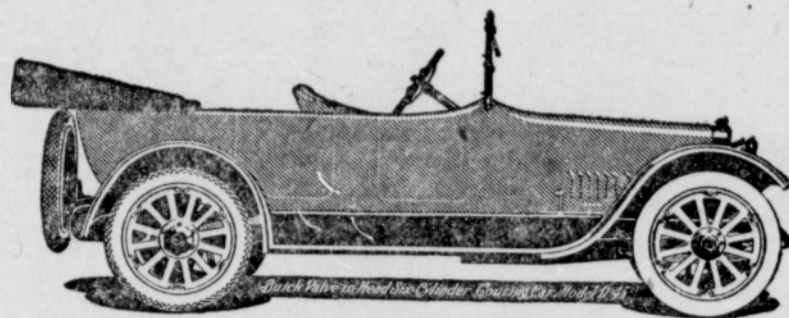
