GRANGERS GATHER HERE FOR QUARTERLY SESSION

REPRESENTATIVES FROM SEVERAL COUNTIES MEET TO DISCUSS POWER PROBLEMS AND OTHER MATTERS OF IMPORTANCE TO STATE.

The Sandy Grange played host to more than two hundred visitors Wednesday when the Pomona Grange met in regular quarterly session in the local grange hall. Delegates were in attendance from several counties and an all-day session was devoted to matters of importance in addition to many interesting entertainment features.

The morning session convened at 10 a.m. and was devoted to routine business. During the noon luncheon recess, the delegates were entertained by the high school band and the grade school rhythm band. Both organizations were enthusiastically received.

The afternoon session was featured by discussion on the part of Stephen B. Kahn, Morton Tompkins, and Richard Neuberger of the Bonneville Authority. These gentlemen discussed the power situation in the state relative to Bonneville.

Matters accomplished during the business session included resolutions placing the grange on record in favor of outside audits of all grange books, asking the state not to abolish the camp grounds on the state fair grounds in Salem, and urging the County Court to bring pressure to collect on bonds covering money shortages in county funds. It was voted to have the Pomona grange sponsor a degree team contest among the county granges.

The evening session included initiation of new members, an entertainment program and moving pictures showing latest developments in machinery sold by the grange cooperative.

The feeding of the entire gathering was successfully handled by a committee headed by Mrs. Bina Bell, Maggie Bell and Julia Herz, and who in turn were ably assisted by all the ladies of the grange.

The grange nimrods killed a total of 7,419 rodents on the black-tail, including four coyotes, 652 rats, 573 ground squirrels, 154 rabbits, 129 mountain boomers, 17 weasels and 155 gophers.

The grange voted to sponsor a degree team contest in Clackamas county during 1938, and award suitable prizes. The report of the executive committee, increasing the (Continued on Page Three)

PRESIDENT'S BIRTHDAY DANCE HERE JAN. 29th

Extensive plans for the celebration of the President's birthday in Sandy were gotten under way this week with the formation of a committee of eighteen, headed by Fred Proctor, of this city. The local activities will center around a big dance in the Odd Fellow's hall January 29th.

The funds realized from the national observance of the anniversary will be placed in a new foundation for the prevention of infantile paralysis, none of the money will be allotted to the Warm Springs foundation as has been done in the past.

This year, all of the funds raised by every community in the United States will go to the new foundation so that a great financial reservoir will be created in an effort to triumph over the dreaded disease of infantile paralysis through the avenues of research and treatment.

The new Foundation will carry on a broad-gauged educational campaign, prepared under expert medical supervision, and this will be placed within the reach of doctors and the hospitals of the country. This will take shape in four ways:

- 1: Science research
- 2: Epidemic Action
- 3: Telling to Doctors and parents the New Care now known to prevent crooked backs, curvatures of the spine, twisted bodies, contracted limbs.
- 4: Dollars to Orthopedic Centers, (hospitals, clinics, etc.) for the immediate restoring of human wreckage.

PEOPLE SHOW DESIRE FOR CO-OP TELEPHONE SYSTEM

200 SUBSCRIBERS EXPECTED FOR NEW COMPANY; O.K. OF STATE UTILITIES COMMISSIONER NEEDED TO COMPLETE CO-OP SET-UP

If the citizens of Sandy have anything to say about it, there will be a new co-operative telephone company in operation within a reasonable time. Residents of the community have signed the petitions indicating their desire to subscribe for service in the new company 100 per cent, according to those in charge of the solicitation. Ed Bruns, well known for his civic interest, has been in the lead position in the work of lining up support for the new company, and it is reported that many have come to his home voluntarily to place their names on the petitions.

The present efforts of the leaders in the move is to produce in petition form evidence of an overwhelming desire on the part of the local phone users to form their own organization before the state utility commissioner. As stated above, the cooperation so far has been without a dissenting voice.

The present operating company has 135 service connections in the district and indications point to the fact that more than 200 signers will desire service from the new company. The additional subscribers will come from not only those beyond the present limits of operation of the West Coast company, but from additional users in the immediate vicinity of Sandy.

According to Frank Christensen, who has been a telephone official in the district for more than 30 years, the new company will be ready to operate within a few days after the O. K. of the commission is received. He points out that the new installations will offer employment to a number of men as well as require expenditures for materials and equipment.
