### GRANGE HOLDS QUARTERLY SESSION HERE WEDNESDAY

allowance to subordinate granges entertaining Pomona to \$35, placing \$100 in a reserve fund, and placing \$50 at the disposal of the committee to aid weaker granges, was adopted. A second vote on the budgetary changes is necessary, however.

The executive committee submitted the following as its 1938 objectives. Extend and advertise the grange co-op to members; extend the grange electric program; continue membership drives which brought Pomona grange membership up to 471 to date; assist subordinate granges when needed; continue the juvenile grange program; further community medicine and hospitalization.

Twelve candidates were initiated into the fifth or Pomona degree during the evening session. Those initiated were Jerry Durham, Sylvia Bowers and Catherine Bowers, Damascus; Robert and Gladys Prater, Garfield; Anna Hollman, Tualaitn; George W. Anderson and Catherine Williamson, Clarkes; L. F. Jonsrud, John T. McIntyre, E. G. Chapin and Faye M. Chapin, Brightwood.

Memorial exercises were held for Wallace F. Miller, Milwaukie.

Among the special committee chairmen reporting were A. N. Kirchem, roads; Mrs. Annie I. Hughes, legislation, and Edyth Tozier Weatherred, first grange memorial at Clackamas, who reported that \$27.00 had been raised toward Pomona's \$100 share of the cost of erecting a marker at Clackamas to commemorate the formation of the first Oregon grange there in 1873

Among visiting grange officers who spoke briefly were Mrs. Weatherred, state chaplain; Tompkins, state overseer; Mrs. G. W. Thiesen, state lecturer; Max Kleigel, state gatekeeper; R. W. Perry, Hood River, candidate for state master; C. W. Miller, Multnomah Pomona master; Jessie Amily, Columbia master, and Theodore Roy, Multnomah county deputy.

Pomona voted to accept the invitation of Mollala 310 to hold the special February initiatory meeting there.

The next Pomona meeting will be held at Clarkes grange in April.
