Waldport Telephone Co. Buys Depoe Service

The Waldport Telephone Co., of which Frank L. Christensen is co-partner with E. T. Sell, has purchased the Depoe Bay Telephone Co. from Jim Langman. This adds ten miles of territory along the coast to be covered by the Waldport Co. which is now servicing the Waldport, Yachats and Seal Rock territories, or a distance of 50 miles between Florence and Newport.

Mr. Christensen states that his company will rebuild the Depoe system with copper wire, the same as that used on the Waldport lines. He adds that more people are realizing every day the uses of the telephone and states that even during the depression their number of phones increased until today it is twice the size when they purchased the line in 1922.
