INSPECTION IS OUT ON HOLLY AS GIFT

Home owners who wish to send cut holly to friends or relatives for the holiday season do not need to worry about inspection, dipping or certification, for all such requirements have been lifted, reminds the state department of agriculture.

Only rooted holly plants or trees need be inspected before mailing or shipping. However, all shipments of cut holly made by licensed nurserymen or dealers must be cleared and certified by the department's bureau of nursery service.

To protect the quality of commercial holly shipments from this state, the nursery service expects to be more rigid than ever in its inspection of commercial holly shipments this year.
