

Time for March of Dimes Again

Oregon, along with other states of the nation, has fired its opening gun in the 1940 campaign against infantile paralysis in honor of the 58th birthday anniversary of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, January 30, according to Dr. E. T. Hedlund, Portland postmaster, who is state chairman.

Already in all parts of the state, county chairmen are making preparations for various events designed to raise funds for the fight against the dread disease.

The 1940 campaign will be concentrated on two main features: the celebrations and the "March of Dimes."

The celebrations, in which thousands of persons throughout the nation have taken part in the past, will include entertainment of all kinds. These will range from huge dances and receptions in the larger centers to church socials and school affairs in smaller communities. All will come to a climax on the President's birthday.

The "March of Dimes" is expected to enlist more millions of people this year than ever before. Many will mail birthday cards containing dimes directly to the President at the White House. These cards are now a fad to all state, county and local chairmen. Others will contribute by buying "March of Dimes" buttons, which this year will be of decorative design, or will deposit their contribution in "March of Dimes" coin collectors to be placed in various stores and public gathering places.

Funds raised will be distributed according to the fifty-fifty plan which won nationwide acclaim in 1939. Fifty per cent of the proceeds will be left in the county where raised for benefit of the chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis embracing that county. The other fifty per cent will be forwarded to the National Foundation.

The Kelso Woman's club will hold a card party Friday evening, 12th, at the home of Mrs. N. C. Peterson.

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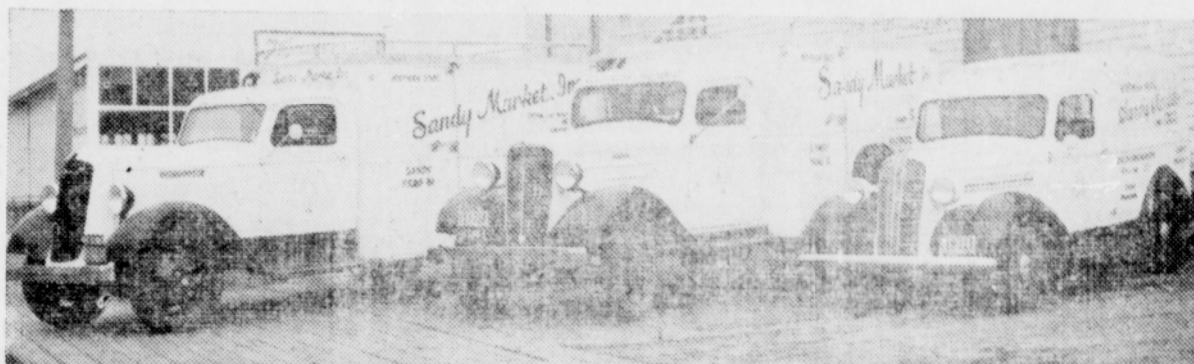


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PICTURE OF FORMER DAYS

Old Laws From Horsewhip Era Are Being Revised

FORT WORTH—City ordinances that literally are of "horse-and-buggy" days will be brought up to date here by city attorneys and national youth administration workers. Laws that will be changed include:

Limiting the time a horse may be left hitched to a carriage or wagon, parked on downtown streets, to 30 minutes during daylight hours.

Prohibiting the feeding of horses, mules, sheep, hogs, cats, and chickens on principal streets.

Limiting the speed of horses around the courthouse to a "moderate gait."

Prohibiting the use of swinging gates, awnings, lamp posts, and fences as hitching posts.

A code of traffic signals involving the use of buggy whips.

Prohibiting loud noises "tending to frighten animals," and meeting incoming trains with hotel hacks.

Soldier of 1939 Retains

Old-Time Expressions

NEW YORK. — The shavetail goofed off when he bunked fatigue. That, according to Col. L. B. Magruder, Second corps area recruiting officer, merely means the second lieutenant made a mistake when he went to bed during a lull in drills.

Magruder got together a list of some of the more common expressions used in conversation among soldiers. They have not changed much down through the years.

Other terms included: battin' the breeze, a conversation which usually ends with an argument as to who won the Civil war; cabbage, money; chow hound, gourmand; circus water, iced drinks with meals; gold brick, lazy soldier; hash heater or slum burner, the cook; java and sidearms, coffee, milk and sugar; jawbone, charge it; mitt flopper, a handshaker.
