FISHERMAN NEWS

The annual hearing of the state game commission pertaining to angling regulations will be held in Portland on February 16, at which time sportsmen's organizations and others interested will be given an opportunity to submit their recommendations concerning seasons and bag limits for game fish.

Of particular interest is the proposed closure of coastal waters to fishing for trout over ten inches in length for a period of about of three months for the purpose of protecting cutthroat trout coming in from the ocean to spawn in the streams.

Bees Are Mild on Ground, Vicious at High Levels

DAVIS, CALIF.—Bees that are docile and meek at sea level become hot-tempered and vicious when released at high altitudes, experiments made by the college of agriculture of the University of California here indicated.

The best test occurred when a swarm of Caucasian bees were shipped from virtually sea level here to the University of Wyoming at Laramie, which is at an altitude of 7,200 feet. The Caucasian bees established themselves here as an unusually gentle strain.

Within a week after their arrival at Laramie, Prof. C. H. Gilbert, of Wyoming university, reported, they had become most violent and vicious.

Arkansas Farm Families Turn to Theater for Fun

LITTLE ROCK, ARK.—Arkansas rural people are turning to the stage as a means of recreation and profit. During the past year, according to June Donahue, specialist in community activities at the University of Arkansas, more than 1,000 plays and pageants were given in which 7,000 persons in various rural sections of the state have participated. Some of the theaters are open-air affairs along the roadside and others are in schools and community centers.

Bird Smokes

ITHACA, N. Y.—Firemen blame a sparrow for a fire which broke out in a second-floor sleeping porch at the home of W. S. Wolf. They said the sparrow apparently picked up a live cigarette butt and carried it home as material for a nest it was building inside a porch partition.

Interesting People We all Know

Rev. A. B. Calder who resides 2 miles east of Boring, is a native of the province of New Brunswick, Canada. He lived for a short time in Nova Scotia. He has preached in New Brunswick, Iowa, Washington and Oregon in the Methodist church, and is a retired member of the Oregon Conference of that church. He is a graduate of the Normal School in Frederickton, N. B. and of the Northern Illinois College at Fulton, Ill. He has taken two post graduate courses, also, one at Chicago College of Science and another at Fulton. He has followed Naturapathic studies as a pastime, taking work in Massage, Osteopathy and Chiropractic. He was appointed by Gov. Withycombe to the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners and served for three and one half years. Following this he was lecturer for a while in the Pacific College of Chiropractic in Portland, on the subject of "Hygiene and Sanitation."

In an interesting trip which he made to China four years ago, he secured material for lectures, which he has given to schools, Granges and Churches since that time.

By a former marriage he has two sons, one a Trade Commissioner for Uncle Sam at Shanghai, China, the other American Vice Consul at Southampton, England. In 1911 he married Miss Mar-

garet Dolan of Portland. She will be remembered as a Woman's Home Missionary Society worker, having held important offices in the Society. During the World War, she was a Red Cross worker in Portland. Later for several years she was secretary of the Board of the Portland Settlement Center and Official Visitor as well.

Rev. Calder fills pulpits from time to time and helps in Sunday School and Young Peoples' work and officiates at many weddings and funerals.

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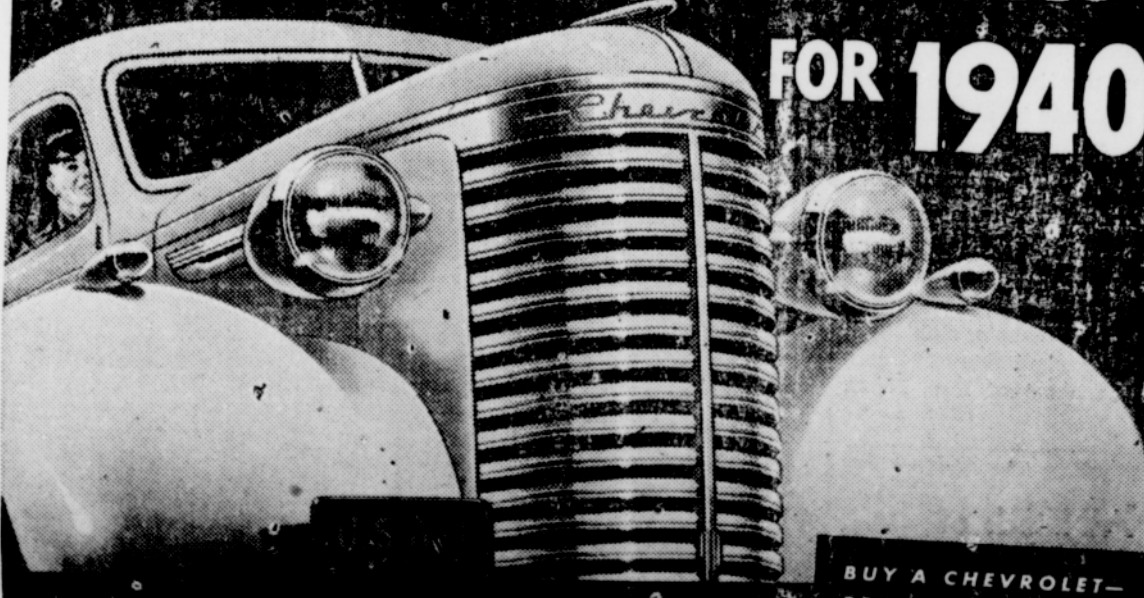
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
