test will be named to the royal court and these princesses will then name their own queen, selecting her on the basis of personality, grace and charm.

The court will be selected on February 19, and first duties of the new majesties will be to rule over the annual winter carnival in Portland and on Mount Hood February 22 to 25. Then the six girls along with a tour manager and a chaperone will depart for St. Paul, New York, Washington, D. C., Miami and thence to Havana, Cuba. Purpose of the tour is to carry the message of Oregon's attractions as the National Winter Playground to the far corners of the nation. A great amount of advertising and publicity, valuable to the entire Northwest, has resulted from the three previous trips sponsored by the Oregon Winter Sports association.

Concerning the carnival itself, Van Dyke reported that the Cascade Ski club will again stage its International ski jumping tournament of Mulltorp mountain near Government Camp as climaxing event of the winter festival. Ole Haugen, veteran of 13 years competition on the northwest's biggest jumping hills, will be chairman of the event and has already laid plans to bring the foremost birdman of Canada and the United States to Mount Hood for the carnival.

Sale of buttons good for admission to the carnival events will as in the past eight years be the sole means of obtaining votes for candidates. Chasing enthusiasts as well as business men and organizations interested in the winter development of our state back the various contestants, for in the words of Portland's Mayor Joseph K. Carson. Each one of the three international good-will tours made by the Oregon Winter Sports association's carnival royalty has been worth more than \$100,000 to the state in favorable publicity."
