HELD IN SANDY

Fred Bates of Eagle Creek gave an interesting talk on the hardships of Samuel Barlow who blazed the Barlow trail and arrived in Oregon City Christmas day, 1841. In 1846, he was instrumental in completing the Barlow road and operated it first as a toll road. The Barlow road is credited with being the greatest factor in the development of Oregon, aside from the railroad which came later.

Edward A. Brown of Portland spoke interestingly on the activities of the Pioneer association of Milwaukie of which he is a member.

L. Kirchem of Logan told of helping his father operate a gristmill for 10 years in the early '70s and thus learned to know pioneers from all over the country who brought their grains from miles around, camping to wait their turn at the mill.

Henry Jacobson of Gresham and Cass Garrigins favored with old-time songs, and Mrs. Rhoda Kirchem gave an old time reading.

The high-light of the meeting was the election of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Cook of Damascus as king and queen for the summer meeting in July, 1940.

Fred Bates was appointed to head a committee to locate the exact place on Laurel Hill where the immigrant wagons were let down with ropes for the purpose of placing a marker there. E. F. Bruns and Buzz Thomas were chosen to act with him.

Jonsrud Park was designated as the place for the next meeting of the society on the last Sunday in July.
