have all three and I surely wish you luck.

In the meantime we all have our problems and the farmers are at this time going through a severe trial. For instance, a year ago we paid 20c each for baby pullets chicks, which were at that time at zero in weight. The matured hens that those chicks developed into are today worth 35 cent if they weight 3 1/2 lbs. The eggs they would have laid, if large, have averaged 1 1/2c.

each, with the minimum cost to bring a hen to laying at \$1. All in all the poultry raisers have had to lose on their investment as well as time and labor.

Weaner pigs a year ago were worth \$4 to \$5 each. Those pigs today if they weigh 150 pounds and are prime are worth about \$12 and it doesn't take a pig long to eat \$7 worth of feed, besides the time and care, so the hog raisers rate about the same as the poultry growers.

So on down the line, leaving the farmers "financially embarrassed," different kinds of work.

Let us bear with each other in our hundreds of dollars in wages have been sacrificed by men working for small logging and mill outfits who promise to pay, but in some cases cannot or simply cunning enough to get out of it. A number of men in Marmot have thus left "holding the sack" in such cases. Yet in some cases those same people who fail to pay their honest help, can go on thru life with a reputation of high financiers and hold their heads up in society while the laboring man is condemned for bad credit.

Yet patience is not without its reward. With the 1940 calendar, the old cow comes back, the best graded Guernsey cows are now worth \$75 or more to the producer, the Kraft cheese company at Tigard is offering 48c per pound for butterfat in sweet milk and creamery offer as high as 38c for butterfat in sweet cream.

Someone said, the other day, if you have the timber, you can get the money. We hope that is true for the past decade it has not been so. With these promises, we have hopes of working our way out in time, while the "farmer plods his wear away, like the sandy Post, he's here to stay."

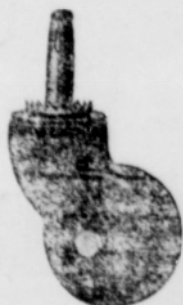
