Vaccination to be Held Wednesday

Miss Thelma Jones, who recently came from Idaho and is now assisting Miss Katherine Bisbee, county nurse, gave a very interesting talk on "Smallpox and Vaccination" at the PTA meeting Tuesday, urging the importance of vaccination at the clinic to be given here next Wednesday.

She quotes a doctor as saying that "smallpox is a disease of stupidity, a disease that there is 100 per cent effective method of control for." She also went on in her talk to state that Clackamas county especially and the state of Oregon as a whole is one of the most is on the "tattle tale grey" list of sections in the United States showing presence of smallpox.

It is with sincerity that the health officers and teachers urge parents to bring their children to Sandy next Wednesday to take the vaccine, if they have not yet been vaccinated. Dr. Daniel P. Trullinger, county health officer, will be in charge, assisted by the nurses and Dr. C. Don Platner of Sandy.

As it is impossible for the group of health workers to attend each school in the district, Brenton Vedder, issues a special invitation to all neighboring school children to be present at Sandy.
