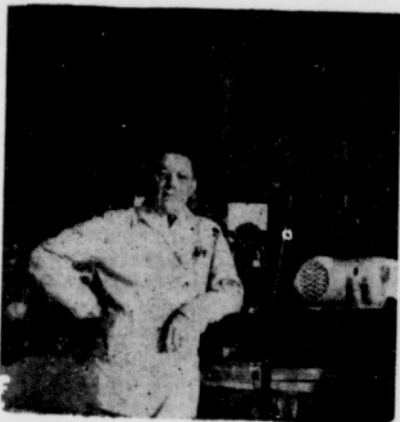

The bands will represent: Estacada, Oregon City, Milwaukie, Mollala, Canby, St. Helens, Gresham, Beaverton and Sandy. The orchestras include Oregon City, Estacada, Mollala and Corbett.

All bands will march from the high school through Sandy at 12:30 P. M. A mass band, consisting of all the musicians, will play two marches under the direction of C. C. Bates, who is host director for the occasion. The band will return to the high school for the festival.

Each musical organization will select its own numbers for a short concert appearance during the afternoon. There are no judges because there is no competition. G. D. Orr has made it possible for the people of this area to hear the young musicians in this part of the state.

There will be no charge at anytime and it is expected that a large crowd will be on hand to welcome the bands as they march through town and to be present for the afternoon's program.

SMALLPOX VACCINATION

"TAKES" SAYS NURSE

Following up the smallpox vaccination clinic, held in Sandy two weeks ago, it has been found that out of the 95 receiving vaccination 91 have been successfully vaccinated, according to Miss Thelma Jones, assistant Clackamas county health nurse.

"We are happy to know," said Miss Jones, "that this number have not only protected themselves against smallpox, but in case of an outbreak, have protected others as well."

This number included children from the three Sandy schools, from Sandy Ridge, Dover, Aims, Bull Run, Kelso and Cottrell.
