DEADLINE SET FOR
TENANT FARM LOANS

Thursday, August 1st, is the last day upon which applications for tenant farm loans can be accepted in Clackamas county for this year's program, advises Clive W. Cook, County Farm Security Supervisor, 11 Beaver Building, Oregon City. Application blanks are available for interested tenant farmers, farm laborers and share-croppers.

While two loans were made in the county under last year's allocation, the program will provide additional loans under this year's funds, Cook explained.

As soon as applications are closed, the county tenant purchase committee will begin reviewing the applications, making recommendations for purchase, and proceeding to make their recommendations as to applicants best qualified for farm ownership.

ADDITIONAL RACING
PLANNED

GRESHAM, July 31 (SPECIAL)—Plans to stage an additional week of horse racing here following the regular six-night turf session of the 34th annual Multnomah County Fair, billed for August 19 to 25, were being pondered this week by the board of directors of the fair association.

If the proposal reaches a successful conclusion, the second meeting will be sponsored by the Oregon Jockey Club, an organization of several bangtail-minded Portland and Gresham men. Preliminary incorporation papers

for the organization have been drawn up and soon will be submitted to the state corporation commissioner and then efforts will be directed toward obtaining the approval of the state racing commission.

The commission will not permit the fair association to extend its regular six-night meet on the local track under its present regulations.

It is believed by the proponents of the plan that the additional week of racing would draw a greater representation of top-flight horses to the 5-8-mile oval here, rated as the best lighted track of its length on the coast. At the same time, the second week would fill a seven-day breach of activity between the regular fair session and the state fair meet at Salem, from where horsemen head to California for the annual fall meetings.

GRANGE SONGSTERS
WILL VIE AT FAIR

The Oregon state grange will sponsor its second annual state fair song contest at the 79th Oregon state fair, which opens in Salem Labor day for a full week. The song contest will be a feature of Grange day, Friday, September 6, with Mrs. G. W. Thiesen of Milwaukie, state lecturer, in charge.

Only members of the subordinate and juvenile granges will be eligible, with winners to be chosen from nine classes: Men soloists, women soloists, duets, trios, quartets, chorus, juvenile soloists, duets and quartets.

Elimination will be conducted through regional contests, closing August 15, and only songs written prior to 1930 may be used. All entrants must appear at the fair contest in costumes appropriate to the period for which the song was written.

The state fair will award first and second cash prizes to the winners totaling \$150 for all the classes. Highest monies, \$22 and \$12, will go to the chorus groups.

The grange song contests were inaugurated last year and were a highly successful feature.
