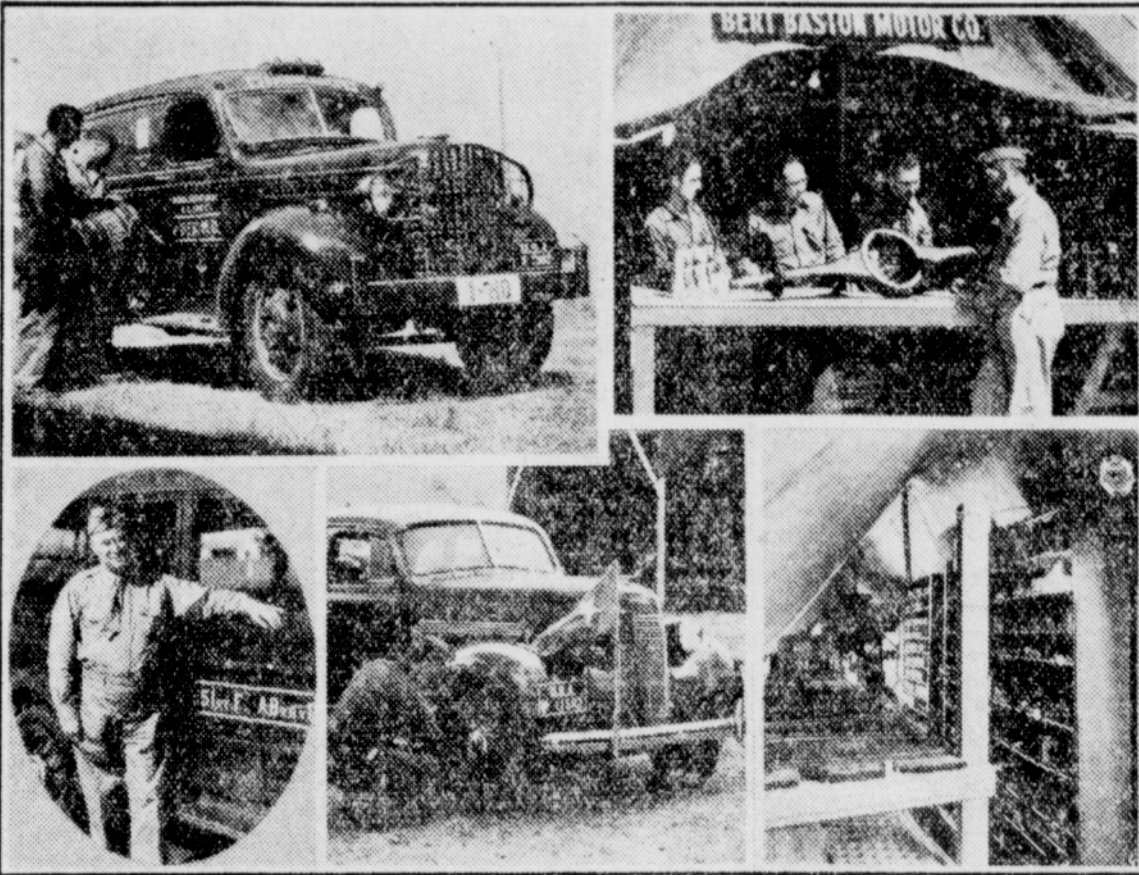

Industry Ready to "Keep 'em Rolling" for Defense



Graphic illustration of the way in which one of America's greatest industries gears its activities with the United States Army for national defense is found at Little Falls, Minn., where the greatest peacetime maneuvers in the history of the country are being held Aug. 3—Aug. 24. To "keep them rolling," Chevrolet, one of the largest suppliers of motor transport equipment to the nation's armed forces, has set up through one of its dealers, the Bert Baston Motor Co., of Minneapolis, a complete parts and service headquarters in the military reservation at Little Falls. More than \$10,000 worth of parts is maintained at this depot, where three service representatives are on duty 24 hours daily to service Chevrolet equip-

ment in use. The 85,000 troops in actual combat maneuvers will use 1,180 Chevrolet transport units, including officers' cars, reconnaissance cars, hundreds of trucks adapted to special uses, and military ambulances.

SEPTEMBER 15 TO BE DEAD LINE

County office of the Agricultural Conservation Association has been notified by Mr. N. C. Donaldson, Executive Assistant, that September 15 will be the last date that growers may sell Austrian Winter Field Peas and Hairy Vetch to the Commodity Credit Corporation on the Seed Purchase Program.

Records in the County Office to date show that 4,456,700 pounds of Austrian Winter Field Peas and Hairy Vetch have been sold to the Commodity Credit Corporation at a total price returns to the growers of \$143,297.70. This seed has been rapidly moved in car load lots from warehouses in Clackamas County directly to Conservation Associations in the southern states. "It is necessary that southern growers have this seed for cover crop plantings early in the fall which accounts for our establishment of September 15 as dead-line," said Mr. N. C. Donaldson.

Dealers are instructed to make ample provision for growers whose seed test have not yet been returned or whose seed has not been cleaned so that they may be able to sell before September 15.
