SPORTSMEN INFORMATION

Copies of the official synopsis of the 1940 Oregon Hunting laws are now available at all Game Commission license agencies, and at Barker's Drug Store, as well as at the Portland office of the Oregon State Game Commission, 616 Oregon Building.

Printing of the synopsis was delayed somewhat awaiting the federal government's regulations on shooting of migratory birds. These regulations arrived from Washington, D. C. about 10 days ago.

Every sportsman who plans to hunt this fall is urged to obtain a copy of the synopsis in order that he may be familiar with new regulations, both federal and state, now in effect.

Fishermen are again urged to send in catch report cards after each fishing trip. Cards can be obtained from sporting goods stores or from the Portland office of the Game Commission, and should be sent to the Game Commission office.

Data contained on these cards will be used in connection with the lake and stream survey now being conducted by biologists to determine where fish plantings may be made to best advantage. During the last few months thousands of report cards have been mailed in by sportsmen, and it is urged that during the remainder of the fishing season those cards be used.

NEWS FROM SALEM

The number of drivers' licenses suspended and revoked during the month of July reached an all-time high for the state of Oregon when suspensions and revocations totaled 177, it was announced by Earl Snell, secretary of state, today.

The July total this year is an increase of 94 or 113 percent over the July total of 1939. The previous highest month was October, of 1937 when revocations

and suspensions totaled 175.

During the first seven months of the year a total of 973 drivers lost their licenses in this state, compared to 692 for the same period last year, an increase of 40 percent.

Of the 177 cases reported for the month of July, 107 were revocations and 70 were suspensions. One hundred-two of the revocations involved persons convicted of driving while intoxicated. For the year to date, revocations for driving while intoxicated total 539.

For the first seven months of 1940, non-resident motor vehicle registration in Oregon totaled 74,417 vehicles against 84,735 for the same period a year ago, a decrease of 12 percent, it was announced at the secretary of state's office today.

July registration continued to show the decline noted in tourist registration this year, with 27,125 cars this year against 31,721 cars for the corresponding month

last year.

Seventy-five percent of the tourist registration in July represented cars from the three western states, Idaho, Washington and California. There were 46 cars from Hawaii, two from Mexico, three from the Philippines, two each from Guam and American Samoa and one from Brazil.

Cave City, Ashland and Brookings led the various registration stations in Oregon in the number of out-of-state cars reported for the month, Cave City with 4,995, Ashland with 4,453 and Brookings with 2,814. Following are the registrations from other cities in the state: Umatilla, 1,373; Grants Pass, 1,250; Klamath Falls, 1,029; Gold Beach, 974; Medford, 895; Bend, 897; Arlington, 883; Portland, 823; Astoria, 437; Baker, 343; Eugene, 507; Huntington, 546; La Grande, 388; Marshfield, 362; Ontario, 200; Oregon City, 219; Pendleton, 395; Roseburg, 409.

LUTHERAN CHURCH OPENS TWO-ROOM SCHOOL

The enrollment of children having outgrown its one-room school Immanuel Lutheran Church added another room during the summer months, and will open its two-room school on September 3. Also the school playground has been enlarged, and now includes a volley ball court.

The Lutheran School, embracing all eight grades of elementary schooling, was opened by Rev. A. W. Schelp four years ago with an enrollment of eight children. This year an enrollment of at least thirty children is expected. Rev. Schelp will this year be assisted in his work by Wm. P. Grunow of Redding, California. Mr. Grunow is a graduate of Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Mo., and will have charge of the four upper grades, while Rev. Schelp will teach the four lower grades.

Concerning the object and purpose of the school, Rev. Schelp says: "Our school, following the state course of study for elementary schools, distinguishes itself only in this, that its program includes an hour of religious instruction every day for all grades and presents all secular subjects in the light of Christianity. The school thus offers a thorough elementary, christian training. Pupils graduating from this school are admitted to any High School, even as graduates of other elementary schools."
