J. S. Greenwood, "Jack" to all those who know him, besides being a Republican candidate for representative from Clackamas county owns and operates store and service station at Wemme. He was born at Rhinelander, Wis., June 29, 1893, and received his education in the public schools and university extension courses.

Greenwood came to Oregon in 1907 and has resided at Wemme since 1913. He is a home owner



and taxpayer. He is a member of the East Side Commercial club, of the Gresham and Sandy Chamber of Commerce, of the Winter Sports association, Masonic, Eagles and Odd Fellows lodges. Christian Motives for Abstinence.

Lesson for November 3: Luke 1:13-16; 2:40; 4:4; 6:21, 25, 43-45.

Golden Text: 14-17.

While other temperance lessons of the year have stressed the injury brought upon a man by the thing, usually strong drink, that leads him to intemperance, today's lesson shows the blessings of temperance and the folly of allowing anything, even something good in itself, to take the place of the better thing.

If drinking were harmless, which it is not, it would be unwise to waste upon strong drink and self-indulgence the precious time that should be given to better things. It was said that John the Baptist should drink neither wine nor strong drink. His life was to be given to something higher than the gratification of the appetites. It is not strange that as a child he "waxed strong" that he was "filled with wisdom," and that as a man he became a great prophet who prepared the way of Jesus.

Now harmless things can become a sin and a snare when they are wrongly used. Some spend so much time in gratifying themselves with food and other things that they have no time and little inclination for spiritual things. Needful material things should not be allowed to crowd out the spiritual. They who deny themselves for the kingdom of God and for their own souls will not suffer in the end. They may be hungry now but they shall be filled.

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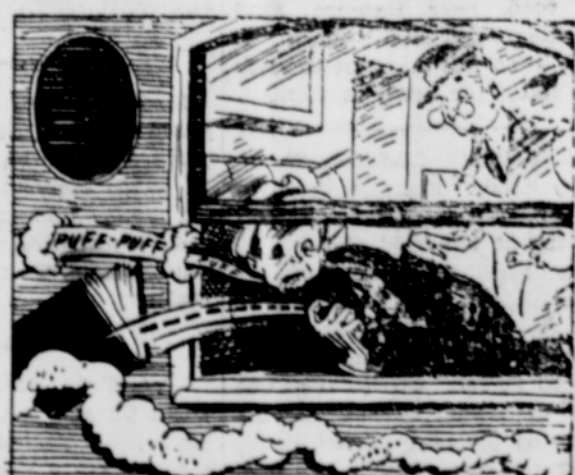
