The Taxpayers of Clackamas County Should Know

'Dog days' will soon be here for the Clackamas county court has set the license fees for dogs for 1941, payments to be received after January 1 and after March 1 a \$1.00 penalty will be assessed. The fees will remain the same as in 1940: 75 cents for male or spayed bitch dogs and \$1.00 for female dogs.

The Portland General Electric company Friday filed an expense statement with County Clerk Guy H. Pace here showing it expended \$2729.95 in assisting to create a measure creating the proposed Clackamas county people's utility district at the recent general election.

Expense accounts of candidates also were recorded and showed that L. L. McFarlane, democrat, defeated for re-election as county commissioner, expended \$144.25; D. T. Meidrum, republican, successful in his race for county surveyor, paid out \$69.80.

Rufus Wood, re-elected county assessor, \$138.50; Edwin A. Woodworth re-elected county school superintendent, \$114.50; Jack Grenfell, defeated candidate for sheriff, \$207.35.
