Frank Parker Stockbridge, author of this column for many years, missed a deadline this week for the first time in his 50 years of reporting. He had probably started writing his column, dictating it to a nurse, when the heart attack from which he was suffering overtook him and he died suddenly.

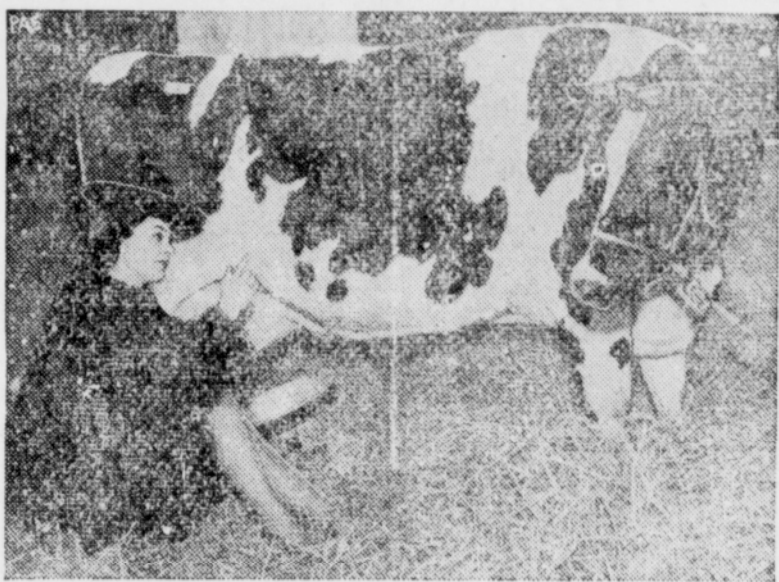
His column was an important part of his life. It was a means of self-expression for an intensely active mind. It was an opportunity to pass on the vast store of information about America and American ways that he had gathered during 70 busy years of living. To some people it is a mental strain to write. To Frank Stockbridge it would have been more of a strain to hold back the things he so fervently wanted to say.

Frank Stockbridge knew he was apt to die soon. His doctors had warned him that unless he gave up all of his many activities his heart was apt to give way. But he had a passion for living actively and a passion for self-expression. It would have been easier for him to give up eating than to give up writing.

The last time I saw him he was planning to write a book about his life. One title he had considered for the book was, 'The Presidents I Have Known,' since he was an intimate of every man in the White House during this century. He said that his wife thought the book should be called, 'No

The most remarkable thing about Mr. Stockbridge's keen mind was his memory. If he had written that book about his life, I doubt if he ever would have had to look at a reference. All the facts he'd ever have needed were catalogued in his mind. I remember when someone asked him recently who was secretary of the treasury under Cleveland. He not only named him—but for good measure spied off the names of every other member of Cleveland's cabinet.

### This weeks Sermon.

Jesus Requires Faithfulness.  
Lesson for December 29: Luke 12:35-48.

Golden Text: Luke 12:48.

The close of the year, with its thoughts of the passing of time should remind us that every day we should be faithful to our Lord.

Referring to an eastern custom Jesus urged his disciples to be faithful and ready at any time for their Lord's coming. In that day men girded their robes about them in preparedness for action—something of which we have recently heard much. And lamps must be trimmed and burning. Picture a ship in a dangerous channel a stormy night, the pilot peering into the blackness for the flame of the lighthouse but seeing it not. It is sad when a Christian's light goes out but blessed when men are helped by a godly

life. There is a story of a fearless girl who, left alone by the death of her father, kept a light burning on a perilous shore throughout a bitter winter. Christians should be faithful keepers of the light Christ has committed unto them.

The reward of the faithful servant is not release from service but commission to larger service and continued faithfulness. But the unprofitable servant shall be appointed 'his portion with the unfaithful.' What wretched company. A dismal figure is that of a man who has been given great opportunity but has failed to make good, has been too small for the job. It is worse for a man to prove unfaithful to Jesus.

Let the close of the year remind us that opportunities pass with passing days and that every day and all the days should be proved in the Master's service, that any day the Lord may find us faithful servants.

### 11 CASES ON NEW DOCKET

The criminal actions, as described by District Attorney Fred A. Miller, have been set as follows:

January 8, Glen W. Marks, appeal from a lower court conviction on a drunken driving charge; January 8, Corwin Harvey, on a morals charge; January 14, William J. Norris, appeal from drunken driving conviction; January 16, Peter J. Gillas, for allegedly attempted arson; January 21, Leon Buller, accused of malicious destruction of another's property.

January 23, Frank E. Noon, appeal from drunken driving conviction; January 27, William E. Walker, on grand jury indictment for drunken driving in connection with an accident after which Mrs. Charlotte Hamilton died May 4; January 28, Harry W. Schoppe, charged with obtaining goods by false pretenses.

The jury term will start off with civil action January 7, that of Adam Schumacher vs. state industrial accident commission. Other two such cases were set as follows: January 15, C. W. Fogelson vs. E. Roy and Eva Jarman and Charles Homann, for \$10,300 damages; January 22, Albert G. Bach, administrator of the Anna Bock estate vs. James Elie Chazem, for \$10,000 damages. Both allege losses resulting from traffic accidents.
