Mrs. Blanch Roberts, Mrs. Bertha Keck, and Mrs. Bert McDonald have been spending the evenings working jig saw puzzles.

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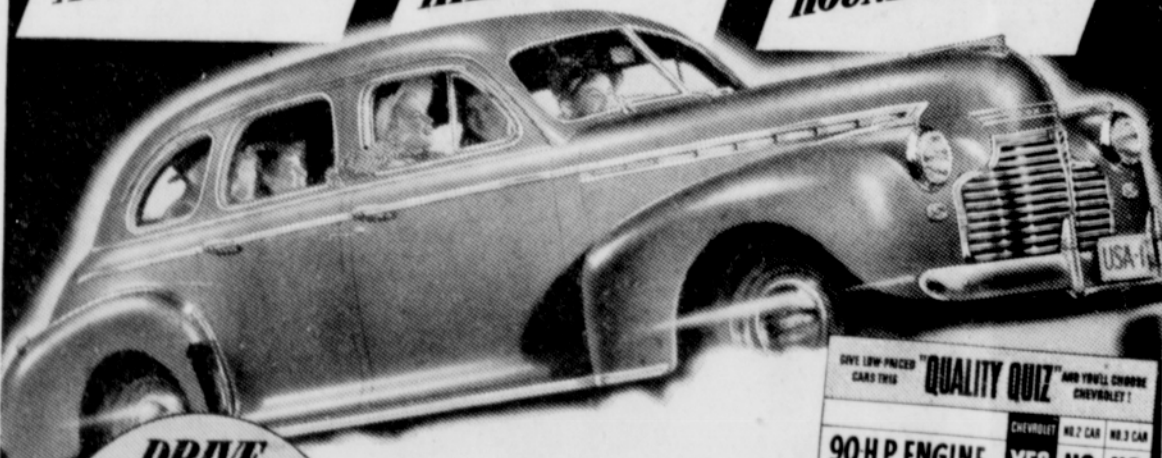
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
