Oregon's cash farm income from dairy products was \$30,000,000.

Defense Work Sponsored Locally

The Rural Youth National Defense Program, which is sponsored by the Sandy Union High school is now holding classes at the Sandy Union High school manual training shop and at Zig Zag, for wood-work, three evenings and Saturday of each week.

The advisory board for this work are V. D. Butler, V. Bosholm, George Anderson and H. C. Compton. The sponsors are our local high school board: W. O. Ganger, Ed F. Bruns, W. W. Howard, Carl Gregson, Roy Wilcox, with G. D. Orr acting as co-ordinator.

The classes at the High school are instructed by G. R. Hugg, and at Zig Zag, by Harry Perkins.

The government furnishes the two shops with sufficient tools to carry on the projects.

At present there are 19 boys enrolled for this work at the High school and 18 boys at Zig Zag. Boys for this work are eligible from 17 years to 24 years, inclusive.

The Sandy High school has filed an application for the establishment of classes in metal work and machine repair.

The Sandy Sportsmen's Association is remodeling their trap equipment in order to comply with the rules of the Oregonian Telegraphic Shoot.

MEASLES STILL LEAD SICK LIST IN COUNTY

German measles continued to lead the list of communicable diseases in Clackamas county last week, although a slight decrease was shown, according to reports submitted to the county health office by 93 per cent of the physicians. The report for the week showed the following maladies: Measles 37, influenza 2, gonorrhea 2, one each of pneumonia, impetigo and chickenpox.

The health department also disclosed there were 26 deaths and 31 births in the Oregon City district during January.

New Rate Schedule Announced

Commercial users of electricity in territory of Portland General Electric company will save approximately \$485,000 annually, based on their 1940 use of current as the result of the new Bonneville-type rate schedule filed by the company with Ormond R. Bean, state utilities commissioner late last week. The new schedule will become effective with all meter readings taken after March 25.

Company officials explained that the new schedule is in effect the Bonneville standard rate for commercial establishments as recommended by Bonneville Administrator Paul J. Raver for public utility districts and municipalities distributing power from the federal project, with an added, temporary surcharge similar to those found in the rate schedules of McMinnville, Monmouth, Cascade Locks, Skamania PUD and other public bodies which are purchasing their power requirements from Bonneville.

PGE, it was announced, has adopted the Bonneville standard rate as its objective and intends to adjust the present temporary surcharge, which is roughly equivalent to the company's taxes, in the light of any future increases in consumption of electricity or other circumstances which result in operation economies that can be passed on to the public.

An important feature of the new rate is elimination of demand charges for commercial users of electricity whose demand is 10 kilowatts or less, a classification in which 91 per cent of PGE's commercial customers fall. Demand measurement will be made by suitable meters, and in any one month will be the customer's greatest average demand over a period of 30 minutes.

The new commercial schedule follows:

First 150 kilowatt-hours, 3.5c a kilowatt-hour; next 350 kilowatt-hours, 2.4c a kilowatt-hour; next 1000 kilowatt-hours, 1.2c a kilowatt-hour; next 13,500 kilowatt-hours, 0.96c a kilowatt-hour; next 25,000 kilowatt-hours, 0.72c a kilowatt-hour; next 60,000 kilowatt-hours, 0.48c a kilowatt-hour; excess above 100,000 kilowatt-hours, 0.36c a kilowatt-hour.

No demand charge for first 10 kilowatts of demand per month; demand charge of \$1.14 per kilowatt of demand in excess of 10 kilowatts of demand per month. The energy charge for use in excess of 360 times the demand shall be subject to a reduction of 0.6 mills per kilowatt-hour from the otherwise applicable rate.

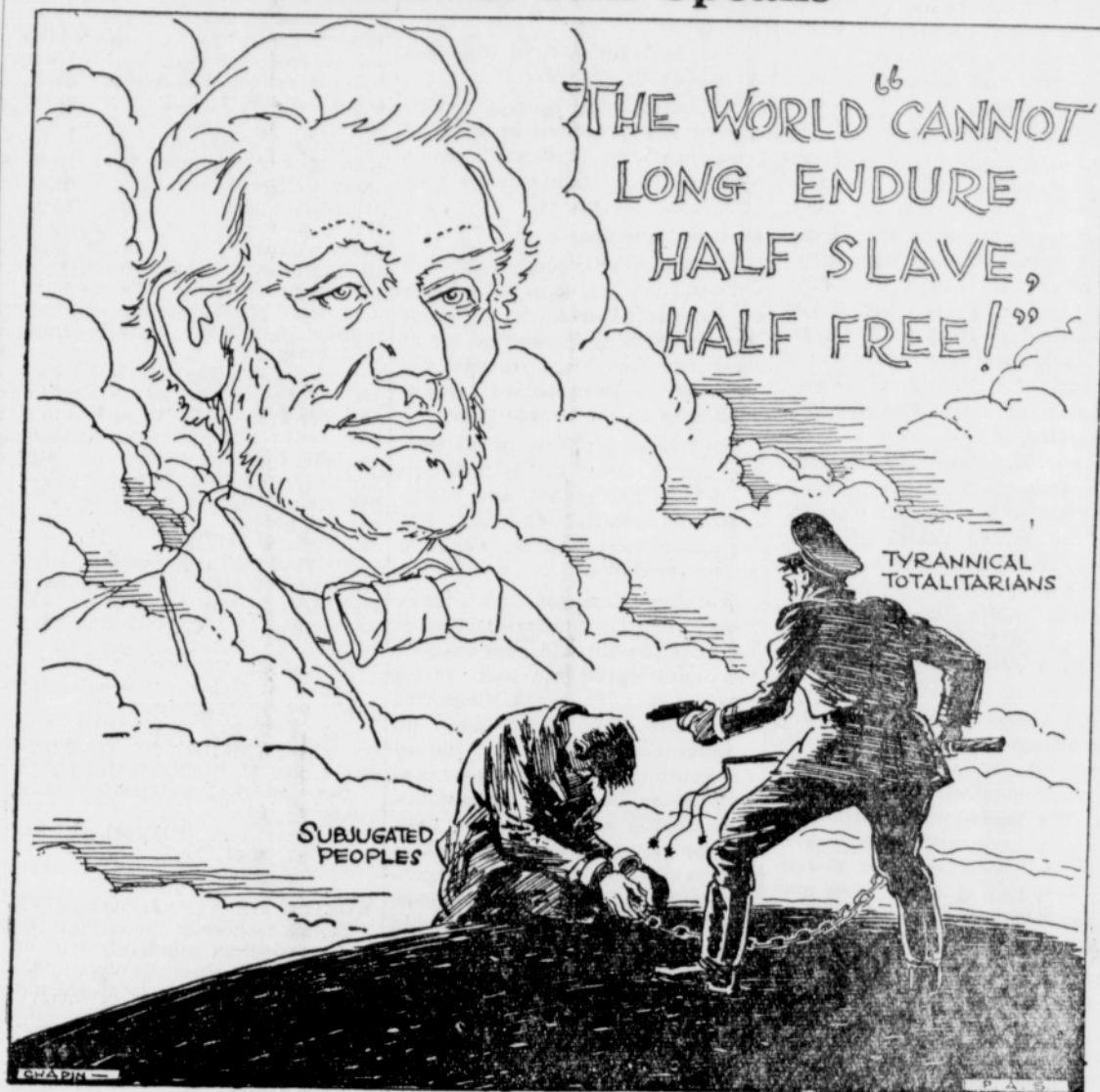
The Markvardsons were presented with a lovely electric percolator.
