## Facts!

### The Taxpayers of Clackamas County Should Know

The Clackamas county court today announced the re-appointment of three members of the county dog control board for terms of two years each. Those re-named were A. L. Heacock, Damascus; Ed Koch, Macksburg; and J. A. Coulter, Clarkes. The board is in charge of enforcing the dog license law in the county and has supervision of payment of damages for animals killed by dogs.

## FFA NEWS

The Sandy chapter of the FFA took third place at the Columbia River sectional contest for the Future Farmers of America in this district. Gresham won first place with 15 1-2 points; Rainier came second with 11 points; Sandy third with 8 1-2 points; and Canby fourth with 8 points. Those who won ribbons for Sandy were: Carl Stucki, who won first place in rafter cutting, and second place in tool and material identification; Wesley Roberts, who took first place in potato grading, and George Larson who took fourth place in corn judging.

Bob Ten Eyck, of the Sandy chapter, won third place in the public speaking contest, which was held in the Gresham High Auditorium. He was one of the eight contestants to enter this contest. James Bany of Canby, came out on top; Hadly Akins of Gresham, came out second and Bob Ten Eyck of Sandy, won third. The winner of the contest shall go to the state meet.

The Oregon State Grange contributed \$100 to be distributed as prizes to winners in the six districts and the state FFA public speaking contests. In each of the six district contests \$15 will be allowed; \$6 of which will be given to first place winner; \$4 second; \$3 third, and \$2 fourth. The other \$10 will be used to purchase medals for three first place winners in the State Contest.

The next evening school shall be held here Thursday, March 20.

A program shall be sponsored by the Sandy FFA chapter on March 24. This shall include moving pictures and other information, relative to the organization and workings of the Dairy Co-op. Association, of Portland.

An FFA meeting was held last Thursday, February 27 which consisted of the general discussion.

## Aged Resident Burns to Death in Cabin

### TRIO BOUND OVER TO GRAND JURY ON THEFT OF HOUSEHOLD GOODS

Two men and a woman accused of stealing about \$500 worth of household goods from a home in the Boring district have been bound over to the grand jury by Justice of the Peace J. R. Hall of Sandy. The two men, Theodore G. and Fred V. Beiser, are being held in the county jail in lieu of \$1000 bail each, and Emily G. Beiser has been released on her recognizance. The charges are for larceny in a dwelling.

### DRIVER'S PERMITS TO COST 50 CENTS MORE

SALEM, Ore., March 11.—Oregonians will pay an extra 50 cents when they purchase their biennial automobile driver permits next year, by virtue of a bill signed by Governor Sprague today.

The money, an estimated \$100,000 for the two-year period, will go toward reimbursing hospitals which have treated indigent persons injured in automobile accidents.

## Auto Kills Boy Near Corbett

Donald Errend, aged 5, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Errend, Jordan Creek road near Corbett, was killed almost instantly Sunday morning when he was struck by a car as he attempted to cross the highway in Corbett, Deputy Sheriff Charles Wilson reported.

According to information given the deputy, the car was driven by G. A. Rathburn, 2954 N. E. 58th avenue, Portland. Witnesses said the boy, who was on his way to church, stepped from behind the family automobile and directly into the path of the oncoming car.

Wilson said he learned Rathburn was driving at approximately 20 miles an hour and stopped 12 feet from the point of impact. The body was removed to the Jacobsen funeral home in Gresham.

### FAIR PREMIUM LISTS READY FOR DISTRIBUTION

Seventeen-hundred and fifty premium lists for the 35th annual Multnomah county fair at Gresham, August 18 to 24, are now ready for distribution, A. H. "Bert" Lea, veteran secretary-manager, announced today. All interested persons not on the fair's mailing list may obtain their copy at the county fair office, Lea explained.

This 103 page publication contains information and premium lists for the livestock, poultry, land products, floral, textile, domestic science, art and boys and girls' club departments.

Principal change in this season's list is the scoring of dairy cattle in the 4-H club department by the classification instead of the comparison system, Lea commented.

G. W. D. Thomson, 84, or better known as "Dad" Thomson, burned to death Tuesday evening at about 10:45 p. m. when his cabin burned, in Sleepy Hollow.

He had been a resident of the community for about 14 years. Mr. Thomson used to be night watchman at the old Sandy Lumber Co. During the past few years he has been employed as caretaker for people owning summer homes in the Sleepy Hollow district.

Mr. Thomson had complained to neighbors about not feeling well during the past few days and it is thought he suffered a heart attack and knocked over a kerosene lamp as he went for air, as the melted remains of a kerosene lamp were found near the body.

Neighbors who reached the scene first, stated that the house was a blazing furnace, catching nearby trees and a wood-pile on fire. The flames were checked from spreading by the fire equipment of the CCC at Zig Zag.

Thomson's body was taken to Oregon City Wednesday morning by the Coroner's office and later in the day Glen MacDonald, state police officer recovered the last of the remains and took them to the Coroner's office.

Mr. Thomson was born in Canada and the only relative known, is a niece in California.
