SELLING AMERICANISM

In these days of committee-forming, when every other person you meet belongs to some committee to aid America or to aid Great Britain, you wouldn't expect much excitement to result from a one-man campaign to arouse a love for America among the people.

This Week IN WASHINGTON

Washington — Reminiscence of World war crowds, Washington is teeming with business men and military leaders who are spending orders and assisting in plans for carrying out the President's program for making the United States an "arsenal for democracy." Hotels are crowded, rents are skyrocketing and the daily transient population of this city is higher than at any time in history.

The position of the United States now has been crystallized by the President, who said in his recent speech broadcast all over the world: "The great task of this day, the deep duty which rests upon us is to move products from the assembly lines of our factories to the battle line of democracy—now!"

Since the President's speech there has been a noticeable decline in speculation as to whether we will become an active participant in the war. The whole tenor of thought here is that we are pledged to perform a miracle.

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of production and that all future events will be influenced by how well that job is done. It is the common opinion that we may get into the war but that the only possibility of staying out is by sending a steady stream of equipment to Great Britain.

A Huge Program

Although there is no clear line drawn as to what equipment will be sent to England, out of the additional \$7,000,000,000 worth of war materials for which the President has asked, that program is expected to get all of the production facilities of the country going at top speed. It calls for:

One billion three hundred and forty-three million dollars for ordnance and stores; \$2,000,000,000 for air craft and engines; \$363,000,000 for tanks, armored cars, etc.; \$829,000,000 for vessels, ships, boats and accessories; \$260,000,000 for miscellaneous military equipment; \$732,000,000 for facilities and manufacturing equipment; \$1,350,000,000 for agricultural, industrial and other commodities; \$200,000,000 for repairs to defense articles, named or loaned; \$40,000,000 for unforeseen contingencies; and \$20,000,000 for administrative expenses.

The major activity here during the next few months will be centered upon turning that \$7,000,000,000 appropriation into seven billion dollars' worth of equipment.

Unemployment Will Deplete

It is expected that the carrying out of this program will practically end unemployment in this country. It is estimated by the bureau of labor statistics that by the time the program is going full-speed, nearly a million jobs will be added in the shipbuilding and aviation fields alone, and that even "white collar" jobs will increase in large numbers as more factories are put to work. When the production program is fully under way, it is predicted here that any unemployed, physically-fit man will be able to get a job.

Strikes in essential industries continue to interfere with defense production—over \$75,000,000 worth of defense orders being tied up last week. But there is no question that the President will take action to see that this doesn't continue. A labor mediation board similar to the one which worked so successfully in the World war will handle disputes between labor and employers.

Big Push for Agriculture

Agriculture is expected to play an important part in the defense program for supplying food and materials to the democracies. Because the President expects them conditions to be improved by an increased demand for farm products, he has been cool to the idea of full parity prices as advocated by farm leaders. Full parity would mean that farm products would be priced to have the same purchasing power in relation to

other commodities that they had from 1906 to 1914. The present appropriation of \$212,000,000 is aimed at 75 per cent parity and that is expected to stand.

ECONOMICS REPORT

If it weren't for the defense program, the report expected to be made soon by the temporary national economic committee would be a major concern of business men. During the past two years the committee has heard over 800 witnesses on such subjects as monopolies, advertising, insurance, labor problems, etc., in an effort to determine how we can utilize our resources more efficiently and for the best interest of the people. The hearings are now completed.

But the expected report, which will probably suggest legislation to aid small business during normal times, is apt to have little bearing on the immediate problem of aiding big business in producing defense supplies. Just as interest in the work of this committee has waned because of the defense program, interest in another committee has increased tremendously—namely, the Dies committee, officially known as the special house committee investigating un-American activities. This committee, now in its fourth year, has just been given an appropriation of \$250,000, six times as much as the original appropriation four years ago.

At the top of the old House building here, the committee's staff has rooms of carefully guarded information about communistic and anti-American activities in the U. S. and is expected to play an important part in safeguarding industry against sabotage.
