OUR LOCAL PROBLEM

Why should we, the taxpayers in this county, pay additional taxes for relief work when the local berry growers cannot find sufficient crews to harvest their crops?

HEALTH IN ARMY CAMPS

If you've heard those rumors about epidemics at army camps, large numbers of deaths in army hospitals, unhealthy sanitary conditions and fast spreading diseases among our recently recruited soldiers, put them down as malicious whispering.

These stories have been going the rounds about practically all of our new and enlarged camps. Whether the purpose is to stir up resentment among families of soldiers, or to create fear for the strength of our army, we don't know, but investigation shows that men in army camps are, in most cases, in much more healthful surroundings than they are at home.

Whispering campaigns can spread false rumors like wild-fire. And there is little doubt that a lot of these army camp stories are planned and paid for by enemies within our gates.

Recent investigation in one camp, where it was reported that the army hospital was overflowing with pneumonia cases and that there had been a large number of pneumonia deaths and that conditions were deplorable, showed these facts: out of several thousand soldiers, two were in the hospital with pneumonia and were well on the way to recovery;

there had been no pneumonia deaths; out of a normal expectation, based on civilian averages, of five per cent on the sick list, less than two per cent were sick; most of the soldiers in camp stated they were healthier than before they came to camp.

Another interesting finding was that a large portion of the soldiers who were in the hospital just had simple colds or other slight ailments, which, in civilian life, wouldn't have kept them from going to work. But the army doesn't take chances. Any sign of sickness means a visit to the doctor, and when he recommends a day of rest it means a day in the hospital. So a large proportion of hospitalized soldiers are the ones who, in business life, would be going to work with the "sniffles."

MOVIE POLLS

Each year the big-time metropolitan movie critics get together to pick the best ten pictures of the year.

After the last poll of critics, Dr. George Gallup of the Institute of Public Opinion made a poll of movie-goers and found the public's First Ten choice included only one picture that was in the critics' First Ten.

It would be interesting if the movie houses in all communities would take an annual poll of their audiences each year to determine which picture was liked best by the people in their town. Those opinions could then be gathered together by some group and the best pictures chosen by combination.

If the moving picture industry had such a nation-wide poll to judge by, it would be in a better position to determine what kind of pictures we want in the future. Now they are apt to judge by the critics' opinion rather than by the opinion of the people for whom movies are made.

Movies are the leading form of entertainment in this country, getting about one-third of all the money which Americans spend for entertainment. Since they are such an important part of most people's leisure life, we should be given an opportunity to have our say about the types of pictures which have the greatest appeal to us.

Well, now, has this world changed so much in the past decade that no one has been able to start from scratch and make a success?

Here's a man who doesn't subscribe to that theory.

Monte Levy, established in a large office building at 50 East 42nd street, New York City, left his office in 1934 and struck off up Broadway with an idea hanging at him, to give up his job and start a business of his own.

Every day he went up and down the street with Opportunity stalking ahead of him. His idea was born anew every time he saw a fat man or an overweight woman carrying around something they didn't want—excess pounds.

He wanted to help them dis- pose of their burden. Not by diet alone, for there are still a lot of people who thing dieting will ruin their health. Not by exercise, for there are many people too tired from work to exercise strenuously—or too lazy.

Monte's plan would require the minimum of effort and will power.

He possessed these assets: opportunity, determination, a reputation, and \$1,000.

His thousand dollars dwindled to nothing as he visualized himself signing a lease for an office.
