This change came about thru provisions of Senate Bill No. 147, granting power to the Game Commission to fix seasons and bag limits. Previously, the attorney general had ruled that no license was required for shooting of non-game animals or predators.

The recently enacted legislation which, because of the emergency clause already in effect, makes it mandatory for any person to obtain a license before shooting any wild animals or predators.
