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EDITORIAL

THE STRIKE MENACE

Our nation is face to face with labor conditions which threaten its future.

Labor dictatorship which can force men to leave their jobs regardless of their own wishes, the welfare of the nation, and in defiance of government itself, is inexcusable.

After all, it is the men, women and children in the United States whose lives, liberty and happiness are at stake in our preparedness drive. No labor dictator can save them from an aggressor, if his acts cause a breakdown in our defense ability. Witness the fallen countries of Europe.

The public favors good wages, fair hours, the best working conditions, and everything within reason that labor has stood for. But, it will finally turn on corruption and arrogance in labor management which threaten the life of a nation, and the right to work for the safety of home and family.

Hundreds of thousands of boys from homes throughout the land are training for the army. Ask them if they have enough rifles, machine guns, airplanes, tanks, anti-tank guns, anti-aircraft guns, enough ammunition for practice—enough of anything?

The boys in training are offering their lives for the nation. Strikers who are deterred from military service at high pay, who shut off coal supplies and manufacture products which are indispensable, actually imperil the lives of the boys who are serving their country for \$30.00 a month.

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tion, the New York Times says editorially that the President should permit the National Defense Mediation Board to intervene in any existing or threatened labor dispute on its own motion without having to wait for the Secretary of Labor to "certify" a dispute to it.

Second, Congress should enact a law for defense industries paralleling the Railway Labor Act which requires employers or representatives of workers to give "at least thirty days' written notice of an intended change in agreements affecting rates of pay, rules or working conditions," during which time collective bargaining conferences should be held or the services of the Mediation Board utilized. While no positive legal penalty is suggested for striking in defiance of such provision, it is pointed out that a negative legal penalty seems essential, namely, that workers striking in defiance of such provisions should lose the right under the Wagner Act to still be considered employees of the company against which they struck.

Concluding its suggestions, the Times said: "While strikes should not be outlawed, neither should they be encouraged by governmental policy. State and Federal labor laws should be revised where necessary to embody the principle that while men are free to quit their jobs at will, they are not free to forcibly prevent other men from taking those jobs. On the same principle employers should not be prevented from offering those jobs to men willing to take them. This means that mass picketing and violence to workers who attempt to enter a plant must not be tolerated by local authorities or by local law. It means also that Federal law should not in effect condone or encourage such violence."

These are moderate suggestions that our lawmakers must heed if they honestly want to curb the strike evil and reduce the danger of irreparable loss to our country.

MOVIES — — — — — war

Deanna Durbin, Clark Gable, or any one of a dozen popular movie idols could quite conceivably have more to do with whether we keep out of war or get into it than the most stirring speaker in the United States congress.

Even President Roosevelt would feel very lucky if he could attract the audience to a fire-side chat that some of the leading movie stars draw regularly to the 15,000 movie houses of the land—and there is no question but that the millions of people who go to

the movies each week are powerfully influenced by what they see there.

Imagine Deanna Durbin taking a part in which she romanticizes over the bravery of soldiers risking their lives for democracy. Then imagine her in a picture in which she pleads for peace and stability and it's easy to picture how much she could do toward stirring emotion in one direction or the other.

If Deanna was given a rousing band-playing, "Go-out-and-fight-em-boys!" part, a million young men would probably be tempted to dash from the movie house to a recruiting station. But if Clark Gable played a hero-man role in which he pictured war as an uncivilized solution to our difficulties, he could influence crowds of men and women to oppose physical combat.

The movie industry thus has a major responsibility in its choice of pictures and its handling of war news this year.

HAYS — — — — responsibility
Will H. Hays, czar of the movie industry, is fully aware of the important part motion pictures play in molding public opinion, as indicated by the following excerpts from his recent annual report:

"The responsibilities undertaken by the industry on every front of total defense demand greater vigilance than ever at the dykes of self-regulation . . .

"In the present emergency we have the organization the machinery, the will and the means to maintain our public responsibility from the social as well as the artistic standpoint . . .

"In the emergency that faces us today the universal entertainment of the screen is a definite element in total national defense . . .

"Much of our entertainment must supply not only relaxation, rest and renewed vitality, but faith and confidence in our future and inspiration for the difficult days ahead . . .

"There is a vast background of beauty and interest in the continent to the south of us, against which background features may be made. Such pictures are bound to bring us closer together . . .

"The motion picture is an instrument of universal entertainment and common inspiration; therefore the leaders of the industry, in this crisis of events, face an unparalleled opportunity for service, and a heavy and continuing responsibility."

ADMISSIONS — — \$673,045,000

Just how important a part of America's entertainment the movies are, was measured by the government in the recent census. The census shows 15,115 movie houses in the country and the paid admissions in 1939 amounted to \$673,045,000, or a little over \$5.00 a year for every man, woman and child in the country. Eliminating

the babies who are too young to go to the movies (if there are any that young), and other people who are too deaf or too old to enjoy screen plays, everyone else goes to the movies on an average of once every two weeks.

Mr. Hays' office estimates even higher than that. He says there are 80,000,000 paid admissions a week. At any rate, it is evident that the movies are a major part of our recreational life.

The government breaks down the amusement dollar spent by Americans to show that 67.4 per cent of all of our amusement money goes to the movie theaters. It also shows that we are today spending 30 per cent more money in movies than we did in 1935.

This amazing increase in the popularity of movies can be attributed solely to one thing—the greatly improved caliber of entertainment which the movies are offering us.

PROPAGANDA — — Inspiration
There is the danger in these serious times that movie producers will misuse their potentialities for influencing public opinion.

It seems to me that the Hays office, which has so successfully curbed crime pictures and sex pictures, and which apparently realizes the present responsibilities of the industry should devote practically its entire effort this year toward keeping propaganda off the screen.

Instead of propaganda, the movies can perform a two-fold service during these times: first, to give us entertainment which will take our minds off the world problems; second, to give us pictures which will inspire a greater love for our country by showing Democracy in action.

We want pictures to make us better Americans—to make us want to bend every effort toward the protection of our country—which will make us deeply appreciate our lot in life.

And we do want good entertainment which will give us the relaxation we need to cope with present day problems.
