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STATE NEWS

SALEM—Former patients of the Salem state tuberculosis hospital will hold their 10th annual "homecoming" here June 19, 20 and 21, Dr. G. C. Bellinger, superintendent, announces.

More than 200 "alumni" are expected to return to the sanatorium for at least one of the three days to renew acquaintance with physicians, nurses and fellow ex-patients.

In addition to the social features of the event, ex-patients are given an opportunity for re-examination by members of the hospital staff to assure themselves

that the disease is still held in check. Last year patients who had been discharged 10 or more years were among those who returned for the homecoming.

Carl E. Hopkins, statistician and field representative of the Oregon Tuberculosis Association, will be the official representative of that organization which annually conducts the sale of Christmas seals to combat tuberculosis. County public health associations, affiliated with the tuberculosis association, will also participate in the event as part of their anti-tuberculosis program.

Dr. Bellinger said that former patients who wish medical examination may write now for appointments. Overnight accommodations will also be arranged for those who make reservations in advance.

Oregon's new speed regulations the new law pertaining to the operation of farm tractors and trailers along the highway, the repeal of the non-resident registration law and other changes in motor vehicle regulation become effective Saturday, June 14th, the day which marks the end of the 90-day period following adjournment of the 1941 session of the state legislative assembly.

After that date, the designated prima facie speed limit on Oregon highways outside municipal areas will be 55 miles per hour instead of 45 miles an hour indicated speed. In cities, the designated speed limits are 25 miles an hour in residential areas and 20 miles an hour in business districts while the speed past school grounds has been raised from 15 to 20 miles and hour.

These designated speeds may be changed by action of the newly created speed control board in the case of areas within city limits or on county roads, and by the state highway commission in the case of state highways. The speed control board, consisting of the secretary of state, the superintendent of state police and the chairman of the highway commission, may act when consulted by city or county officials in connection with changing designated speed limits in cities or on county roads or upon their own motion after traffic engineering surveys. The state highway commission will make changes only on a basis of traffic engineering studies.

Tourists from other states will not be required to register their cars when they enter Oregon after June 14th, due to the repeal of this law, it was pointed out by Earl Snell, secretary of state. Repeal of this law is expected to save the state of Oregon approximately \$20,000 annually in administrative expenses.

Of interest to farm operators are changes in the law relating to the operation of farm tractors and trailers on public highways. After June 14th, the amended law will permit farmers living in the area west of the Cascades to operate

their tractors along the highway a distance of five miles from their farm without licensing the tractor or the trailer. In the area east of the Cascades, the distance is extended to ten miles from the home farm. Under this law, those farmers whose places are within the prescribed distance from markets may haul produce to those markets with tractors and trailers without paying motor vehicle license fees.

The law changing the weight classification for light delivery and pick-ups which may be licensed for \$5 goes into effect July 1st, the start of the half-year period. After that date, vehicles of this type up to 4,500 pounds may be licensed for \$5 a year. The present law places a limit of 4,000 pounds on vehicles licensed for this fee. However, the secretary of state pointed out there has been no change in P. U. C. requirements which provide that commercial vehicles over 4,000 pounds of a private carrier classification which are operated for a distance exceeding three miles from the limits of a city, are subject to P. U. C. fees. Thus, while vehicles of 4,500 pounds may be licensed for \$5 a year after July 1st, if they are operated out of town beyond a distance of three miles, they will be subject to P. U. C. regulations.

which ever listened to any program is believed to have heard the President's fireside "chat" to which reactions have poured in from all over the world. The talk was re-broadcast to foreign nations in the German, Italian, French, Spanish and Portuguese languages, leaving no doubt that people in every nation now know the stand of the administration on facing the dangers which confront us.

The President's plea to the American nation has not, however, consolidated opinion in Washington, where the debate between interventionists and isolationists has become more furious than ever, with the isolationists realizing that they are the minority but still arguing that they have the backing of the American people who are opposed to a fighting war.

There are many congressmen who have not given a clear expression of their opinion on the great issues at stake, some of them waiting for a further insight into public opinion and others waiting for the authentic report on the present state of our national defense program which the President is scheduled to make in the next few days.

The President is required by the lease-lend law to make a report on the progress of our defense program every 90 days. The report which he is now preparing will cover its progress up to about the twentieth of May. It is expected that the report will not specify the kind of materials already sent to Britain, but will give information on just how many dollars worth of goods have actually arrived in Great Britain.

A large number of government officials are following the progress of our defense program with keener interests than the developments of the war in Europe itself, realizing that whatever part we play the safety of this nation depends on a miracle of production only possible by a united effort of the whole nation. The shipyard strikes on the Pacific coast brought about by a comparatively small group of machinists who were seeking a wage increase from \$1.12 an hour to \$1.15 an hour, have resulted in angry demands from people in every state for congress or the President to take action to make such a condition impossible in the future.

Admiral Emory S. Land, chairman of the maritime commission, proposed the use of federal forces if necessary to bring about a resumption of work in the shipyards and other navy officers have suggested that the yards be taken over by the government.

Plainly worried over our shipping situation, Admiral Land, who recently gave out figures which were interpreted to show that few ships carrying goods to Britain were being sunk, explained in a speech to navy men, "No matter how the figures are given out, no matter how they are interpreted or misinterpreted, our shipping service is serious to the

point of desperation. We need ships, ships and more ships."

Emphasizing the scope of the production job we have to do, Stacy May, chief of the bureau of research and statistics of the Office of Production Management, compared our production of durable goods in 1940 with plans for 1941 and 1942.

"In 1940," said Mr. May, "our durable goods production totaled in value about \$15,500,000,000 and of this total only about two and a half billion was for military use. That was only 14 per cent of the total. This year, 1941, our production in durable goods for military use will total almost 10 billion dollars in value, or about 64 per cent of our 1940 production. Next year, according to plans and contracts our durable goods production for military use will total a little more than 16 billion dollars in value, or about 6 per cent more than our total for both civilian and military needs in 1940."

Thus, if our production for civilian use in 1942 is as great as it was in 1940, this nation will have to produce as much durable goods in 1942 as it did last year. According to Mr. May, and other OPM officials, this can only be done by putting every community in the nation to work on defense production.

Civilian organization, which has again and again been referred to by government leaders as vital to the success of our defense program but which has not been adequately defined or crystallized, has been stimulated by New York's Mayor La Guardia, recently appointed by the President as director of civilian defense. His job is to mobilize the people so that all of us can work to support the defense program.

Most officials in Washington consider the fiery mayor to be a good man for the job, because of his great energy and organization ability, but there is considerable objection to permitting this important job to be a part-time job. Mr. La Guardia, in addition to his new appointment, is continuing his time consuming occupation as the mayor of the largest city in the world.
