AUTHOR OF 'HOW TO WIN FRIENDS
and INFLUENCE PEOPLE'

In 1928 a man moved to Schenectady, New York, to look for a job. He looked everywhere, but could not find one. His name was

Martin Sjostrand. He was a carpenter, and was handy with tools.

He was told that there was a carpenter's job at the General Electric company; so he hurried there as fast as he could go. At last! But when he got there he found that the person who had told him had been too optimistic. The job was merely that of a repairman in the refrigerator department.

Repairman? He was above that! But it was the only job that he could get; so he decided to accept and make it a good job. Instead of bemoaning the fact that he had the humblest job of anyone in that section of the plant, he started in to see how he could develop it and make it worth while.

Everything seemed against him. He had been born in Sweden, his parents so poor that he didn't even finish grade school. At the age of 14, he had been obliged to help support the family.

There were few jobs, little opportunity so he had raised money to come to America when he was 19. He got a job as a farm hand in Minnesota during the summer. During the winter he worked as a carpenter. In the meantime, he married. His wife was from Schenectady; she wanted to be near her father so Sjostrand moved to that city.

And now he was working as a repairman in the refrigerator department!

He knew nothing about refrigerating machinery, but he was determined to learn. He stayed after hours, asked questions, read books on the subject. He acquired a set of tools and began to experiment at home in a little workshop he had rigged up.

One day he made a suggestion for improving the work in his department of refrigerator-building. The surprised manager accepted the suggestion. It was not long till he turned up with another idea. Good.

Well, Martin Sjostrand became the greatest idea man in the great General Electric company. In ten years he turned in 127 suggestions of which 78 were put into practice. Each one brought a cash reward of from \$2 to \$35.

During the year 1939 he made so many suggestions that the company voted him the highest honor in its power—the "Charles A. Coffin reward," bestowed each year on the man in the organization who does the most outstanding work. There are 65,000 employees of the company, and last year the reward went to the emigrant from Sweden (who still

ROY MEYERS APPOINTED COMMISSION MEMBER

Governor Sprague has announced the appointment of Roy Meyers of Eagle Creek, as a member of the Commission of five created by the last legislature to advise and assist the Highway Department to commemorate and celebrate the centennial anniversary of the commencement of civil government in Oregon.

The appointment is commendable; Mr. Meyers is ably fitted for this type of service by education and background. He has taken a keen interest in Oregon history, and has the valuable collection of letters, papers and historical data left by Philip Foster. Mr. Meyers' wife is a granddaughter of Philip Foster co-builder of the Barlow road and first treasurer of the Provisional Government, and probably next to Dr. McLoughlin, assisted more pioneers at his farm at Eagle Creek, than any other person.

Oregon City being the end of the immigrant trail really places Clackamas County in line for one of the final acts of the great pageant which will roll across the

continent following the Old Oregon Trail from the Missouri to the Willamette.

The Sandy Pioneer Association with its organization and records will undoubtedly play an important part in the re-enactment of this great drama.

OREGON STATE GAME NEWS

June 30, 1941

All traps set for wild animals that may be trapped legally must be marked with a brand approved by and registered with the Oregon State Game Commission, under provisions of a law passed by the 1941 legislature. Applications for brand approval and registration are now being received at the Portland office of the Commission.

Landowners or lessees of land may use unbranded traps for unprotected nongame animals. In this regard, landowners or lessees must register the location of their land and obtain a permit to hunt or trap fur-bearing animals but there will be no fee charged for this permit.

While the resident trappers must continue to pay a \$3 license fee, non-resident trappers must obtain a license costing \$25 before trapping fur-bearing animals in Oregon.

Another provision of the new law requires that warning signs shall be posted in conspicuous places within 50 feet of all traps larger than No. 5 or with a jaw spread of more than 10 inches.

The 1941 trapping season will be during the same period as heretofore, from November 15 to February 15. Mink, otter and muskrats are the only fur-bearers that may be taken. This does not apply, however, to predatory animals such as cougar, wolves, wildcats, coyotes, skunk, badger, weasel and civet cats, which may be killed at any time of the year.

There is an all-year closed season on beaver, raccoon, fisher, marten and ringtail cat.

Rifles may not be used in hunting China pheasants and other upland birds in any part of the state during the fall bird season, according to gun regulations announced by the Oregon State Game Commission.

This regulation is designed to prevent injury to individuals from stray shots and also is expected to stop the illegal practice of use of rifles to shoot at birds from automobiles on or by the highways.

All shotguns must be plugged down to three shots when hunting upland game birds during the hunting season. Shotguns loaded with buckshot or birdshot are barred from use in hunting for big game. Guns with less than 1,700 foot-pound muzzle energy will not be allowed for antelope. Under the new regulations, guns used in hunting elk will not be allowed if smaller than 30 calibre except when using cartridges with bullets of not less than 1,400 foot-pound energy at 100 yards distance or weighing not less than 150 grains.

J. Inskeep. The Turkey meeting is slated for July 11 and the poultry meeting the following day, July 12. Both meetings start at 10 o'clock in the morning. According to the county agent's office, poultry and turkey producers in Clackamas county are invited to attend.

The election of officers, business meeting, and a review of the past year's activities will be part of the program at each meeting. Producers will be given ample opportunity to make comments or suggestions regarding the programs.

At the Turkey Improvement Association meeting that will be held July 11, Professor H. E. Cosby will discuss Feeds and Feed Formulas, and Dr. E. M. Dickinson will discuss Pullorum Disease in Turkeys.

One of the Federal Coordinators of the National Poultry Improvement Plan from the U. S. Department of Agriculture will attend the Poultry Improvement Association meeting and will discuss changes in the plan. G. W. Avery, Oregon delegate to the National Poultry Improvement Plan Conference, will report on the convention.
