Rose Shearer, Katherine Larson and George and Carl Sharnke went fishing at Paulina Lake over the week-end. They reported a good catch.

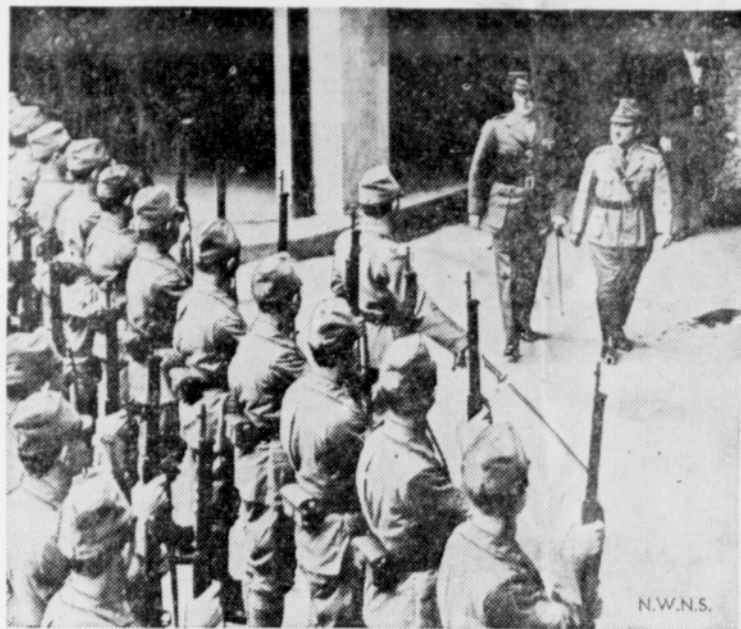

DEVICE WAR END VISIONED

Clackamas county's war on pinball and slot machines and punchboards, begun February 3 with a sweeping raid and seizure of 177 allegedly gambling devices, apparently reached its close Monday.

Last on the lengthy list of cases for prosecution by District Attorney Fred A. Miller were more than 40 cases against pinball machines. Monday, Miller announced he had dropped these cases, and distributors of more than 70 machines impounded by the sheriff's office began hauling them away.

The district attorney's action followed last week's adverse decision by Circuit Judge Alfred P. Dobson, Portland, in two test cases against pinball operators, in which he dismissed gambling charges filed against them.

of his six month period to re-enroll for another period. The maximum length of service is two years.

CCC enrollees are paid in two ways. Part of their wage comes in the form of good food; sturdy clothing; and educational and recreational opportunities.

Regular CCC enrollees are paid \$30.00 a month in cash. Those with dependents agree to allot \$15.00 to them; \$7.00 per month is put into a savings account and paid in a lump sum when they leave CCC. Thus, an enrollee, who stays six months, is paid the \$42.00 which he has saved when he finishes his enrollment. If he stays a year, he receives \$84.00. An enrollee is paid \$8.00 per month for his personal expenses.

Opportunities are given to complete the general education and to learn special vocational trades. Types of training offered at the various camps include:

Bridge construction, carpentry, concrete construction, Diesel engine operation, drafting, jackhammer operation, landscaping, sign painting and making, stone masonry, surveying, truck driving, and welding.

Boys wishing to enroll for July should apply at the Clackamas County Public Welfare Commission, room 11, Court House, Oregon City, at once.

Applications are now being taken for enlistment in the Civilian Conservation Corps for July enrollment.

To be eligible to enroll in CCC, a young man must be—
1. A citizen of the United States.

2. Unemployed and in need of employment.

3. Of good character.

4. Between 17 and 23 1-2 years.

5. Unmarried.

6. Out of school.

7. Physically and mentally fit, and able to do vigorous work.

In order to be selected, each applicant must agree to serve one full term of six months. Ordinarily he must agree to serve in any CCC camp in the United States. An enrollee may decide at the end
