Mr. and Mrs. James Sutherland went to Kalama, Washington to attend a reunion of the Sutherland family.

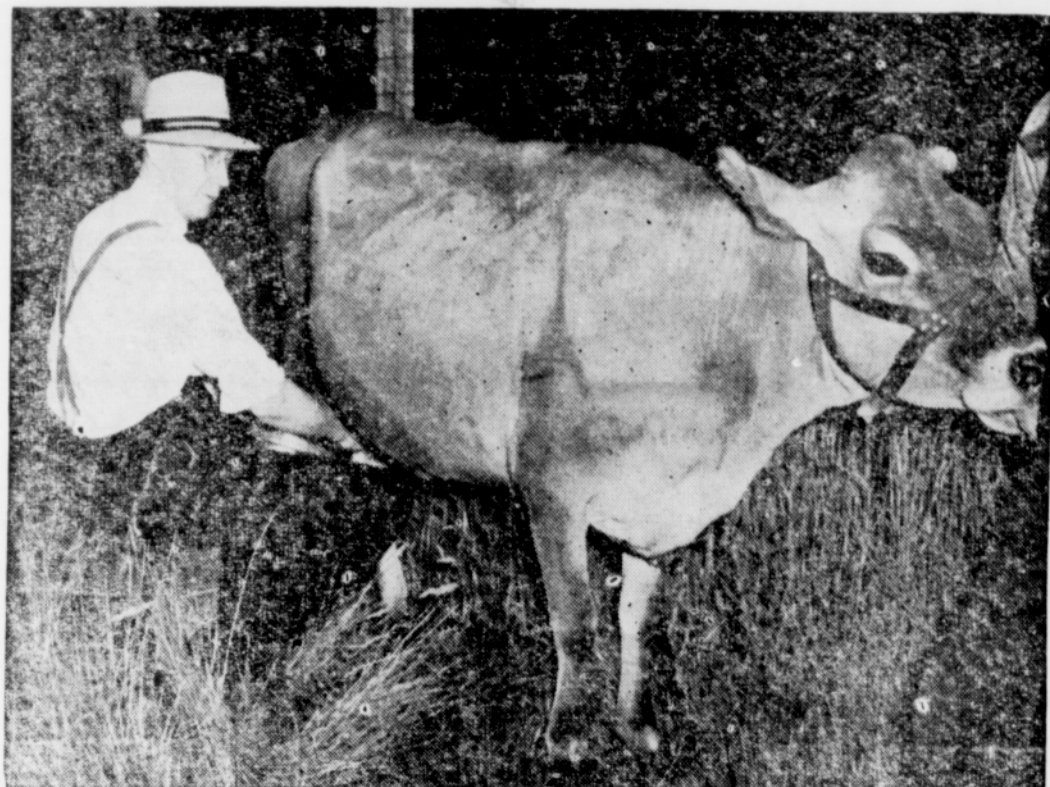
Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Norquist returned last week from a very enjoyable vacation spent at Tacoma and Seattle.

Hey, Mr. Mayor, Can You, Milk A Cow?



A challenge to "come on in" on the mayors' cow-milking contest is being issued to the mayors of Clackamas county's nine other incorporated towns by Dr. Lionel E. Helder, who heads the city government at Molalla.

And Dr. Helder is no slouch as a milker. Here he is pictured, extracting milk from three-year-old "Tootsie," a purebred Jersey owned by A. D. Courter of Molalla.

The challenging mayor, who will perform in the county-wide contest which will be a feature of the 35th annual Clackamas County Fair, August 27 to 30, at Canby, admits he isn't, as yet, in the

best form as far as milking goes, but hints that he may get in a few more rehearsals before the big contest on the last day of the Fair.

Back in 1910, Dr. Helder "pailed" as many as six cows night and morning in Sweet Grass, Mont., and for five years before that, up in Saskatchewan, he milked a cow occasionally. But as a bookkeeper in the London stock exchange, he grew a bit "rusty" as a milker.
