IMMANUEL LUTHERAN CHURCH TO INSTALL PRINCIPAL-TEACHER

In opening its new school year, Immanuel Lutheran school will be in charge of Mr. Elroy Venzke, newly called teacher and principal of the institution.

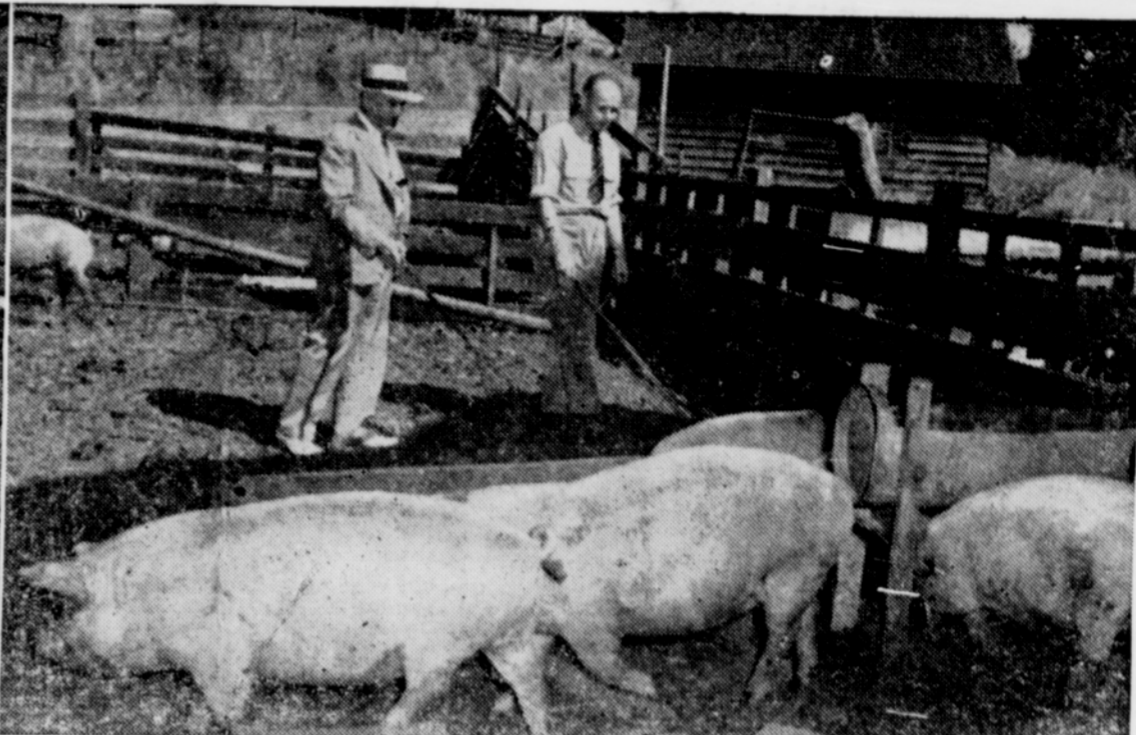
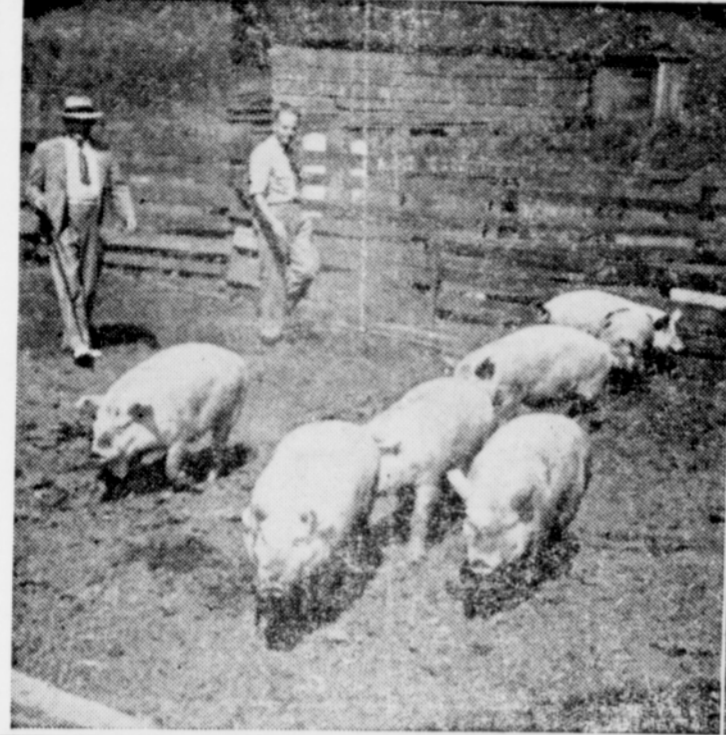

Trucks Hoodooed This Week in Three Accidents

Trucks and truck drivers from Sandy seemingly were having bad luck this week. Jimmy McHenry fell asleep last Tuesday morning about 3 a. m. on the Wapinitia cut-off, about 5 miles west of Bear Springs and collided with a large tree. Some fishermen stopped at the scene of the accident and with the help of other truck drivers and the Forest Service, succeeded in chaining the truck cab to the tree and by pulling with another truck, extracted Jimmy from the smashed cab after about an hour and a half's work.

He was taken to The Dalles hospital by ambulance. He suffered a broken right leg and face lacerations. The Ford truck which was owned by Floyd and Jimmy McHenry, is a total wreck.

Duane Knapp turned his truck over with a load of lumber Tuesday evening about 10:30, when he was crowded off of the road at Mitchell point on the Columbia river Highway. The truck suffered considerable damage but Duane escaped unhurt.
