Well Known Local Pioneer Passes Away

George C. Maronay, 73, died at 5:30 p. m. Tuesday, November 11, at 4332 S. E. Yamhill, Portland, where he has resided for the past six months.

He was born in Masdon, Wisconsin, July 4, 1868, and came to Sandy from Alaska 43 years ago, making his home here until recently. For twenty-one years he has been in business in Sandy.

Mr. Maronay came west at the age of 19, and worked in Washington and Oregon until the Alaska gold rush to the Klondike. At this time he joined the rush and mushed it through with the best of men through the hardships.

Coming back to Oregon in 1898, he visited his father John Maronay, who ran the Old Barlow Toll Gate at that time, near Mt. Hood.

When he first came to Sandy, Mr. Maronay helped construct the first cabin on top of Mt. Hood. The lumber was carried up on the men's backs and by pack train. Before the building of the house, Mr. Maronay and Lige Coleman lived in a tent on the peak.

While digging in the ice on the highest peak, Mr. Maronay unearthed the bones of a prehistoric animal. These bones and Mr. Maronay's picture are on exhibition in the U. S. Forest Service in Washington, D. C.

Mr. Maronay was a charter member of the Sandy Masonic Lodge and the IOOF Lodge No. 195.

Surviving are his daughter, Ethel Maronay, of Portland; sons George and Ralph of Portland, and John of Sandy; five grandchildren; and three sisters, Mrs. George Lampher, Hoquiam, Wn.; Mrs. Emerson Davis, Albany; Mrs. Catherine Stewart, Washington, Iowa.

Funeral services will be held Saturday, November 15, at 2 p. m., from the Chapel of Carroll's Funeral Home in Gresham, with final committal at Sandy Cemetery. The Sandy Masonic Lodge will officiate.
