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BEFORE THE DAWN

Dusk is falling on the great American game of baiting the other fellow. It was a game played by politicians, labor leaders and business men. But it is not a game that can be played in the darkness of war. We are now fighting for our life in this darkness. Tolerance toward any group which hampers our effort is a thing of the past. We must win the war if we are to see the sunlight of freedom again.

As the bombs began to fall on Honolulu, labor held the whip. Witness the final victory of the C.I.O. in the soft coal controversy—the granting of a closed shop in the captive mines. Labor should now be warned that the time for fun is over. Union leaders must remember that the great body of American workers are just that—American workers. And all Americans have two jobs to do. No one is exempt. The job of war production that we have been doing is but child's play compared to what must come. That is the first job. The second job is intangible. But it will take the labor of all of us if it is to be successful.

We must begin now to lay the groundwork of fiscal and economic policies that are as essential to our way of life as a military victory. Here again labor as an organized group may be the deciding factor. It has the power. It must have an equal amount of judgment. Labor must do its part in urging curtailment of non-essential spending. It must urge the adoption of sound tax and regulatory measures, thus stimulating the productive capacity of industry. It must use restraint in all things. In brief, the exigencies of war must waken in labor a permanent sense of responsibility commensurate with the new power it acquired as the darkness of a long war night closed in.

"TRAILER VAGABOND"

DONNER LAKE, CALIFORNIA

Ninety-five years ago the tragic Donner party would have given anything for the road that runs past this little, forest-hemmed lake now. Because it didn't, then, three dozen members of that valiant band of pioneers lost their lives. The forty-five immigrants who survived had a struggle that made history.

Lured by tales of a land of perpetual springtime, this famous group, led by George and Jacob Donner, were one of hundreds of parties heading westward by 1846. Leaving Illinois in April of that year, the Donner party was tired and worn when it reached what is now the city of Reno, Nevada. It camped for a rest that proved its undoing. That delay caused the party to be trapped by a winter that came a month early that year.

Pushing on, the pioneers reached here late in October as snow began to fly. Freezing, the band was forced to seek shelter in crude bough and canvas huts. The all but perpendicular walls of granite barring their way to the inviting valley beyond were made the more impassable by snow and ice. Drifts swirled up around the shivering people to a depth of twenty feet. Their oxen wandered away and perished in the snow. Soon the starving group of 81 was subsisting on tree bark and what few mice could be trapped.

Finally a brave ten men and five women decided to forge ahead afoot in search of help on the other side of their granite prison walls. They were halted Christmas Day by another storm that raged for a full week. Six men died. The other travelers were forced to resort to cannibalism in order to survive. After 32 terrible days, two men and five women won through to the valley and the Johnson Ranch, where the town of Wheatland, California, now stands.

In quick succession, four relief

parties were sent to the Donner's rescue. The first, reaching the dazed, starving and half-frozen party on February 19th, brought out twenty people. The second rescued seventeen more on March first. The third found nine immigrants still alive but four were too near death to be moved.

Among the five starting back with their rescuers was Tamson Donner. She didn't go far. Bidding her two little daughters farewell, she turned around and fought back through five miles of drifts to nurse her dying husband. She had vanished when the fourth rescue party arrived here at Donner Lake to find that one man still lived among the bones of his fellow travelers.

The Donner party's heroic struggle fills a broad page of the history of the winning of the west. In memory of those hardy people, an eleven-acre tract near here has been set aside and a stone and bonze monument erected in honor of their fortitude.

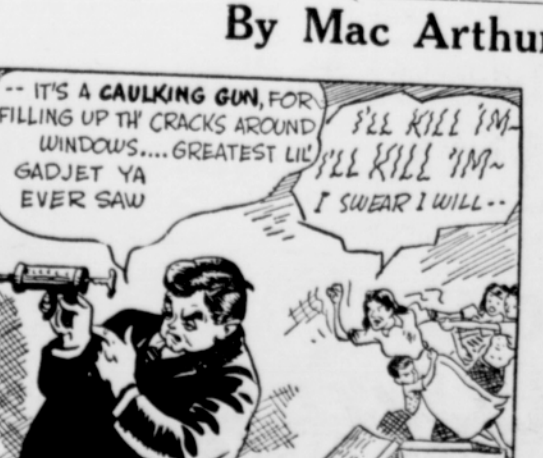
U. S. Highway 40, the most traveled artery between the East and central California, now skirts this little blue lake that witnessed the suffering and privation of the Donner party. It climbs the precipitous, seven thousand-foot Donner Pass that defied those pioneers, and then twists down into the valley that lured thousands of immigrants to peace and contentment—and many to their deaths.

TRUCK GASOLINE
CONSUMPTION LOWERED

How heavily loaded trucks can increase their speed over hilly routes yet cut down their fuel consumption has been demonstrated in formal tests observed and certified by the Contest Board of the American Automobile Association. The paradoxical result—more tained by the use of an automatic speed on less gasoline is ob- booster engine, added to a standard truck. Whenever grade and load conditions impose too great a burden on the truck engine, the booster engine cuts in automatically and adds its power to maintain road speed.

The A. A. A. tests, one on the Pikes Peak highway, and one at Berthoud Pass, on U. S. 40 west of Denver, recorded the performance of a Chevrolet one and one-half-ton tractor unit equipped with a Clark automatic booster engine, towing a semi-trailer heavily loaded with steel plates.
