PROPERTY OWNERS

Complying with Sec. 110-349, O. C. L. A., as amended by Chapter 359, Oregon Laws, 1941; which reads in part as follows—"Every person and the managing agent or officers of any Firm, Corporation or Association owning or having in possession or under control taxable personal property shall make a return thereof to the Assessor of the County in which such property is located, on or before the 26th day of January, 1942, at the office of the Assessor, with the approval of the State Tax Commission, may prescribe— The Assessor shall cause blank forms for such returns to be prepared and distributed, but failure to receive or secure the form shall not relieve any such person, managing agent or officer from the obligation of making any return herein required."—and which provides a penalty for refusal or neglect to file the returns as required, the Assessor's office at Oregon City will, on December 26, 1941, mail to each Personal Property Taxpayer of record on the 1941 assessment roll, a blank form as provided above.

Any person owning or having possession of taxable personal property in Clackamas County who does not receive one of these forms within a reasonable time after this date should call or write for one at the Assessor's office.

Cooperation of all concerned in this matter will result in a better personal property assessment as well as a material saving in cost to the county.

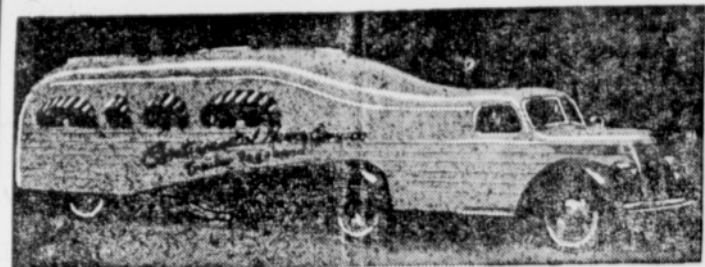

"TRAILER VAGABOND"

LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA
At the first report of hostilities in the Pacific we streaked for the West Coast to see it gird for war. Expecting excitement, we arrived here to discover that we, ourselves, were the only excited people in town. The city hums with activity but everyone is calm. There isn't an ounce of fear in the whole populace but there are billions of tons of confidence in these busy people. That's the stuff that helps win wars.

Even a number of black-outs haven't shaken the nerves of Los Angeles and surrounding points. The first few were more of a lark, but now they are taken for what they really are—vital necessities in the protection of life and property from a possible rain of destruction from the skies. For failure or refusing to black-out effectively a \$500 fine may be imposed, along with 60 days in jail.

The problem of blacking out a large metropolis is a complicated one. If it were simply a matter of pulling the main switches at local power companies, it would be easy. But power must remain on for the running of machinery and a thousand activities must continue behind masked windows and doors.

There are 60,000 street lights in this city alone. 27,000 of them can be doused at almost a single throw of a switch. But the remaining 33,000 comprise 800 separate ornamental lighting systems that are controlled by cut-offs scattered over 450 square miles of town. Ordinarily a full half hour is required in which to turn them off every dawn. The method of blacking them out as soon as the sirens howl is being perfected.

A strange experience it is to move cautiously through the dark canyons between buildings on streets last seen in a blaze of lights. Hollywood Boulevard, gay and bright during our nights here

a year ago, is suddenly transformed into a blackened lane peopled by barely discerned ghosts. Famed Willshire Boulevard becomes an avenue on a gloomy, dead planet.

Even criminals have gone patriotic since "Pearl Harbor." Although there are a few cases of looting during a black-out, local crime as a whole took a decided slump after our war was declared. The biggest problem of local police stations has become the registering and finger-printing of thousands of eager applicants for auxiliary police and air raid warden work. Army and Navy recruiting stations are swamped with enlistments. Everyone is anxious to do his bit.

Naturally a few mistakes are made. It is rumored that one man was detained four hours at a police station before it was discovered he had yellow jaundice.

A three-minute blast of the city's sirens plunges it into total darkness. The only trouble now is that there aren't enough sirens around the town to effectively spread the alarm. You're likely to bump into a black-out without warning if you aren't near a fire station when the signal blares forth. Additional sirens are being installed throughout the city so that everyone will hear the warning simultaneously and no one gets a head start.

When the "all clear"—one minute blast—wails out over the city everyone welcomes the ensuing flare of light. They can once more go about their business—a business that deals largely these days and nights with the task of getting those lights to stay on for keeps.

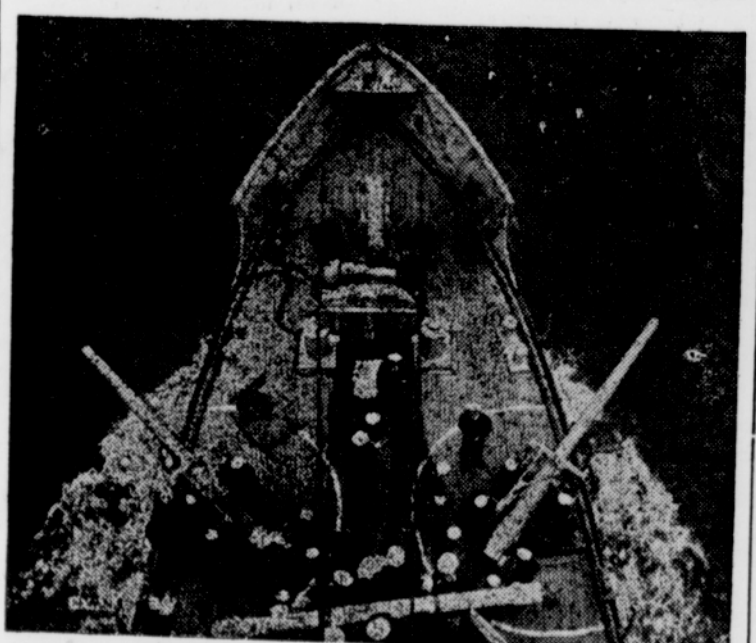
Sandy High School News
