NOTICE TO PERSONAL
PROPERTY OWNERS

Complying with Sec. 110-349, O. C. L. A., as amended by Chapter 359, Oregon Laws, 1941; which reads in part as follows—"Every person and the managing agent or officers of any Firm, Corporation or Association owning or having in possession or under control taxable personal property shall make a return thereof to the Assessor of the County in which such property has its situs for taxation. All returns shall be in such form as the Assessor, with the approval of the State Tax Commission, may prescribe. The Assessor shall cause blank forms for such returns to be prepared and distributed, but failure to receive or secure the form shall not relieve any such person, managing agent or officer from the obligation of making any return herein required."—and which provides a penalty for refusal or neglect to file the returns as required, the Assessor's office at Oregon City will, on December 26, 1941, mail to each Personal Property Taxpayer of record on the 1941 assessment roll, a blank form as provided above.

Any person owning or having possession of taxable personal property in Clackamas County who does not receive one of these forms within a reasonable time after this date should call or write for one at the Assessor's office. Cooperation of all concerned in this matter will result in a better personal property assessment as well as a material saving in cost to the county.

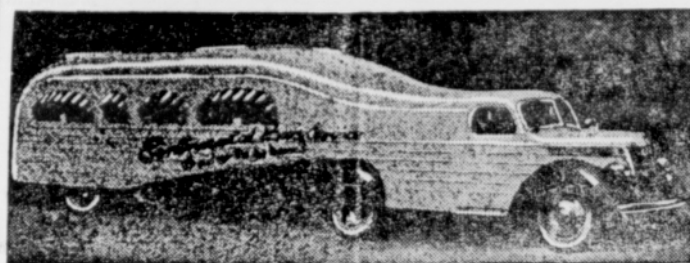

"TRAILER VAGABOND"

LITTLE TOKYO

Los Angeles has a "ghost town" all its own. You've heard of these places. A thickly populated area that is suddenly vacated, leaving only memories that grow with the years in the minds of the old timers. Normally they are found only in the desert where some rich mining property died a quick and violent death and the people moved away to search for riches in a more lucrative spot. Los Angeles "ghost town" was caused, not because people moved out, but because the FBI moved in.

Fifty square blocks of northern Los Angeles comprise an oriental city within a city. Here, in a mixed atmosphere of the East and West, 20,000 native and foreign-born Japanese have made their "Little Tokyo", the largest Japanese colony in the United States.

This is the area that has caused so much speculation during the recent months of strained relations between the U. S. and Japan. Many of these people are American born. They eat, act, think and dress American. There is little reason to think they are not as good citizens as you or me. BUT—thousands were born in Japan. They still shuffle around in sandals and kimonos and cling to the beliefs of their mother country. What would be their attitude if hostilities began?

All the bad apples were removed from this big barrel as soon as war was declared. The FBI and local police are keeping a watchful eye on this sizable chunk of L. A., but they are inclined to believe that there will be little trouble here to mar "Little Tokyo's" past good record for law and order. The majority of the settlement's traitors and foreign agents were known to police long before war was declared. They are now safely behind bars. This policy of

allowing known spies to remain free until a real crisis develops has sometimes been criticized, but it is a fact that it is easier to watch and check the actions of a known agent than it is to arrest him and then begin to hunt down the person soon appointed to replace the imprisoned spy.

On the night of "Pearl Harbor" you couldn't find a foreign-born Jap in our ghost-town with a spy glass. They fled to their homes as soon as Japan moved against Hawaii. They feared the flood of whites that immediately thronged the narrow streets of "Little Tokyo." But no violence ensued. The visitors were merely curious as to how the settlement was taking the turn of events. But, contrary to usual procedure with white visitors here, that crowd and the ones that have followed have kept their purses snapped shut.

Bordering "Little Tokyo" is L. A.'s equally interesting Chinatown. The inhabitants of the two foreign colonies mix about as well as water and oil. Animosity between the two factions has always smoldered, but now it is showing a flame. The Chinese are donning special buttons announcing their race, so that Western eyes can distinguish them from Japs.

But those Western eyes will probably be sensible. Though they seem to be looking elsewhere for trinkets and objects of art, they'll regard the Japanese of "Little Tokyo" with little alarmist's suspicions. It is quite apparent that most of these people are praying for an early American victory, so business can return to normal.

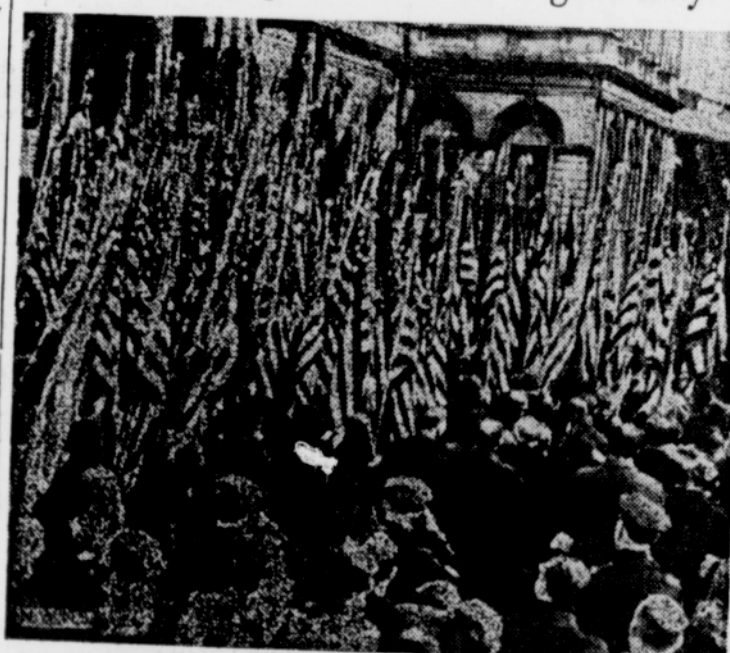
Cameras

Employment
Office Now
Federal

The Portland office of the Oregon State Employment Service is being transferred from state to federal control, effective January 1, 1942, and will hereafter be operated as an office of the United States Employment Service.

L. C. Stoll, formerly state director and who last week was named U. S. employment service director for Oregon, authorized the federalization announcement today after confirmation from John J. Corson, director of the U. S. employment service, and James G. Bryant of San Francisco, regional representative.

"The role of the U. S. employment service in the victory program is of paramount importance and I am depending upon you to do your part," Mr. Corson said in notifying Mr. Stoll of the change.

The 24 offices of the state department are being federalized following President Roosevelt's request to governors asking that arrangements be made to transfer personnel and necessary equipment to the federal government in a nation-wide re-organization to meet increasing demands of war industries.

All employees of the State Unemployment Compensation Commission engaged in employment service functions will become federal employees at their present rating and salary under the merit system. In addition to the employment service supervisory staff, about 20 employees from the training section, research division and accounting office are being transferred to federal service.

The Portland office will remain in its present location, 1130 S. W. Start street, under the management of Gerald C. Knapp, but will operate under the name of the United States Employment Service. Claims for unemployment insurance under the state law will continue to be taken at the local office by federal employees and transmitted to the state agency for determination as to eligibility.

In announcing the change, Paul V. McNutt, federal security administrator, said that the United States Employment Service hoped to meet the labor needs of the war industries through a three-point program:

(1) by transferring workers displaced because of priorities to war production,
(2) by making increased use of existing and potential labor reserves including women, older workers, Negroes, and minority groups against whom there is frequent discrimination, and
(3) by making more effective use of those already employed through upgrading of workers and transfer of needed workers to war production from less essential jobs.

Training of unskilled or only partially skilled workers through government- or industry-operated training programs will play a big part in this program, he said.

TO STUDY GAME LAWS

The Oregon State Game Commission will hold on January 10 at the office in Portland, its annual meeting to determine the angling regulations for the ensuing year.

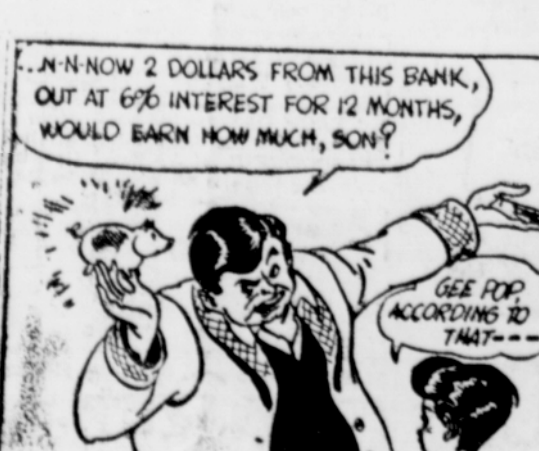
