

AAA MEET OUTLINES
ANTI-WASTE PROGRAM

Adoption of a conservation program for American motorists in which all drivers are urged to co-operate was a highlight of the 39th annual convention of the American Automobile Association last month, Dr. E. B. McDaniel, who represented the Northwest at the conference, reports.

Dr. McDaniel, president of the Oregon State Motor Association,

and vice-president of the national group, outlined the anti-waste program as follows:

- 1—Drive slowly; unnecessary speed wastes fuel, is hard on tires, and shortens the life of your car.
- 2—Continue to use your car for necessity and recreation but avoid unnecessary driving.
- 3—Keep car in tip-top operating condition at all times; lack of proper care hastens the car's trip

to the junk yard.

- 4—Drive smoothly; avoid "jack-rabbit" starts and slam-bang stops.
- 5—Keep tires properly inflated at all times; both over-inflation and under-inflation cause excessive wear.
- 6—Drive safely; aside from deaths and injuries, traffic accidents reap a terrific toll in automobile property which in the months to come will not be so easily replaceable as in the past.

- 7—Have your brakes inspected at frequent intervals; also check on front wheel alignment.
- 8—From time to time, shift the tires from wheel to wheel as a means of distributing wear.

- 9—Keep car well lubricated at all times and don't forget to change oil at intervals recommended by the manufacturer of your car.
- 10—In general, observe common-sense rules of car care and cautious driving; by doing so you will help to save materials needed for national defense, you will reduce the likelihood of being involved in an accident, and you will realize substantial money savings in the operation of your car.

COUNTY AGENT STARTS
REGISTERING STEEDS

In response to requests made through the newspapers and radio program by the U. S. Army, 26 horses have been registered in the County Agent's office this past week, according to County Agent J. J. Inskeep. Of this number, all but three are draft horses.

The matter of registering horses is a very important requirement of the U. S. Army, which has announced that if needed horses will be purchased, or in cases of extreme necessity will be requisitioned at a moment's notice.

Horses registered should be not less than two year of age and not more than ten years. Owners should state whether horses are

saddle or harness horses, should give color, age, sex, and state whether or not the horses are necessary to the owner.

Registrations are due on or before January 10, according to Lt. Colonel F. W. Koester of the Remount Area, San Mateo, California. The Clackamas County Agricultural Defense Board will appreciate cooperation on the part of horse owners.

GLARE IS SERIOUS
TRAFFIC HAZARD,
MOTOR CLUB SAYS

With three out of every five traffic fatalities taking place at night and over half of pedestrian traffic deaths occurring between 6 p. m. and midnight, many attributable to glaring headlights, the Oregon State Motor Association appeals to motorists to always dim the lights on their cars when approaching oncoming vehicles.

"Glaring lights greatly reduce visibility," said Dr. E. B. McDaniel, club president, "and on the open road when approaching another car, the courteous driver always shifts his headlights to the

passing beam. This not only gives the approaching driver a 'break' but actually makes passing safer for the driver who dims his lights, since the visibility of both is greatly enhanced.

"Laws in most states, including Oregon, require that the driver depress open road beams when other cars approach," the A. A. A. club executive continued, "but observations on many highways in all parts of the country indicate that motorists are not doing so."

GAS PUMPS LEAD
LIST OF LICENSES

More than 22,200 licenses and certificates of registration were issued by the foods and dairies and weights and measures division of the state department of agriculture during 1941. Fees from these licenses are used to carry on the regulatory work for that particular field for which the license is paid.

In excess of 60 per cent, or 14,448 licenses were for gasoline pumps and another 1225 were for non-gasoline pumps. The 1941 scale law brought 1223 applications for licenses, of which 521 were for scales over 3000 pounds capacity.

Among other licenses and certificates of registration issued by this division were: Bakeries, 550 with 376 manufacturers and 174 distributors; carbonated beverages, 104; commercial feed brands, 1434; commercial fertilizer brands, 172; economic poison brands, 922; egg dealers, 755; grade A shippers, 92; dairy grading, 613; milk products plants, 217; grade A dairies, 99; grade A plants, 34; garbage feeding, 75; butter and cheesemakers, 210; state testers, 45.
