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The Oregon Future Farmer boys are carrying out a wartime program — proof of this fact is brought out in an annual report submitted to the national organization of Future Farmers of America at Washington, D.C. on August 12th.

This report shows that the boys in this vocational youth organization, under the direction and guidance of 54 agricultural instructors, have gathered and sold 948,905 pounds of scrap metal, 81,238 pounds of paper and 4,656 burlap bags. They have cooperated in the "Food for Victory" program by increasing their swine breeding animals by 70 per cent, sheep 23 per cent and beef by 35 per cent. The report shows that 67.7 per cent of the 1,562 dairy cows in the students' supervised practice program have a yearly butterfat record of 350 pounds or better. The livestock breeding animals increased from 3,818 to 5,169 this past year. In addition, 14,158 were fattened for meat purposes. Over 1600 Future Farmers had war gardens and 464 are assisting with the home gardens. The total investment in farming by F.F.A. members is \$344,533.26—an increase of \$117,196.16 over the previous year. In the farm machinery and adjustment program which has been inaugurated and sponsored by the Secretary of Agriculture, 1,024 boys in 55 chapters have repaired farm machinery at school and home valued at \$20,844.87.

In addition, they have sponsored 33 chapter subsidiaries including chapter-owned incubators, bull, ram, and boar cooperatives, and swine and dairy chains. Over 800 cows were tested for butterfat. The boys in 41 chapters purchased cooperatively 2,501 pounds of certified seed corn and 314 pounds of grass seed, besides purchasing, mixing and feeding 17,309 pounds of mineral to their project livestock.

Uncle Sam Wants Skilled Mechanics for the Army

Men who have worked with farm machinery, in garages, or merely followed mechanics as a hobby have a very special place all picked out for them by Uncle Sam in the Army of the United States.

Stressing the need for mechanic soldiers in America's new mechanized Army, the War Department has worked out a plan whereby successful applicants with mechanical skill who are able to qualify will receive supplemental on-the-job training to fit them for newly created Army technician ratings in the Ordnance Department, Signal Corps and Army Air Forces. These ratings will be given to successful candidates by the Ordnance Department to instrument repairmen, diesel engine mechanics, electricians, opticians and radial engine mechanics.

The Signal Corps is seeking telephone and telegraph cable splicers, installer-repairmen and repeater-men, radio operators and repairmen, telegraph operators, telegraphic printer operators, telegraphic printer installer-repairmen, and telephone and telegraph wire chiefs. Important places in the Army Air Forces will be filled with

aircraft mechanics, armorers, radio their local Selective Service Boards, mechanics, radio operators, metal workers and welders. Opportunities for enlistment under this program are limited to October 15, in the ages of 18 to 44 inclusive, and Detailed information may be obtained at local recruiting offices.
