Add hundreds of these bits of information together, and our enemies have a too-accurate estimate of American military strength.

These are our soldiers—Americans, all—whom we endanger by these "little slips."

This is not a "blackout" on news about our soldiers. Considerable latitude in reporting personal experiences gives the enemy little military information, if the troop units, the ship names are kept secret. But in articles about soldiers and sailors and in addresses for them, don't give away their fighting units.
