HITLER COULDN'T DO BETTER

An incident is taking place in Puerto Rico which should be brought to the attention of every American citizen. As an island territory of the United States, it is being used as a guinea pig for social experiments at the hands of socialist politicians working under cover of emergency war powers granted by the people of this country to their government for the efficient prosecution of the war. It is an abuse of power that should make a fair minded observer see red.

The war is being fought to preserve and reestablish the principles of representative government and individual rights. But the same officials who pay lip service to these war aims have proceeded to ape Hitler in Puerto Rico. As the New York Times recently pointed out, at the insistence of American government officials the Legislature of Puerto Rico in the last two sessions has: "(1) provided for government ownership of more than half the island's sugar lands; (2) turned all of the sugar mills into public utilities, subject to regulations of the Public Service Commission; (3) authorized the government to purchase and operate all forms of communication; (4) provided government ownership of all means of transportation; (5) cre-

ated a government bank in which all insular revenues may be deposited; and (6) authorized the formation of a development company thru which the government may engage in any form of private business."

The people of Puerto Rico have futilely opposed the destruction of private ownership. American courts have condemned it, pointing out that the emergency powers of government were never intended for such application. But the process continues. Puerto Rico is fast becoming a socialized state under the jurisdiction of the United States. What irony!

Is this a preview of "the brave new world" we may expect to see in expanded form in this country and other countries which this nation is now helping to liberate?

DILUTED FAITH

This nation has always been unbeatable because the people have had faith in their form of government and in private enterprise. Their faith brought them freedom—spiritual, economic, and political. It also brought them unprecedented comfort and security. Any man or woman, regardless of race, color or creed, was free to come and go as he pleased, work for whom he pleased, and by thrift, bring security and well-being to himself and his family. He could go into business for himself and if he made good no one resented his success. Yesterday these things were so, without question.

We now hear predictions that we will have some measure of socialism after the war. We hear warnings that the people intend to have "total social security." If they cannot get it 100 per cent under the present system, the implication is they will demand it under some other system. Material comfort with many has clearly taken precedent over things of the spirit, altho lip service is still paid to American traditions. Federal bureaus and many public officials promote this counterfeit doctrine.

A good example of diluted faith in America was contained in a recent news report from Washington, which stated that in the near future an energy resources czar would be appointed to "control production and distribution

of coal, oil, and electric power." The long-range purpose of this and similar official planning is to pave the way for the ultimate taking over by government of all natural resource industries—socialization.

Natural resource industries are the foundation of free enterprise. They have served the nation well. They have contributed to stable employment and higher living standards. There is no sound reason for making basic changes in their ownership or their methods of operation. Proposals for their socialization mean that officials with "diluted faith" are trying to straddle a political fence. That is not the kind of "faith" that built this nation.

TIME TO HELP

The right of any business to advance by the initiative of its owner or management, operating on a competitive basis, has given this country a merchandising system that is now of incalculable value to consumers in money saved, and in the greater variety and better quality of products and merchandise offered.

Retail stores never before faced such problems as today. Securing goods for distribution requires expert knowledge, foresight and an understanding of laws and regulations heretofore unheard of in this nation.

There is one request that merchants now make of all consumers: Between now and the time full war rationing takes effect late in February, don't hoard. The merchants ask this because they are cooperating with government to the utmost to avoid disruption of consumer supplies. Merchandisers, no matter how efficient, can not distribute products that don't exist. Lend-lease and military demands have made deep inroads on supplies of all kinds. It is up to the consumer to cooperate in dividing what is left.
