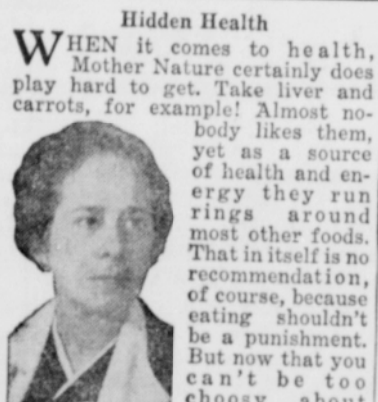

The Home Front

Judging by the friends they've made, "liver birds" hide their origin completely. Have the butcher cut liver in slices 1/4-inch thick. Place in shallow pan, cover with boiling water, let stand about 30 seconds, then remove from water. Spread with generous tablespoon of bread dressing, press flat, roll lengthwise and fasten with toothpicks or string. Roll in seasoned flour, brown quickly in hot shorten-

ing. Add 1/4 cup water to drippings in skillet, pour over birds and bake for one hour in a preheated 350° oven.

Sour Cream Cabbage

Whole Wheat Bread - Butter
Carrot-Honey Cookies
Milk

Carrot-Honey Cookies Recipe
2 cups sifted all-purpose enriched flour
1 cup raisins
1/2 cup chopped nut meats
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup strained honey
2 eggs, well beaten
1/2 cup grated raw carrots
Sift flour, measure, add baking powder, soda, salt and spices. Sift again. Add oatmeal, raisins and nut meats. Mix well. Cream shortening, add honey, creaming thoroughly. Add eggs, beating again, then add carrots and mix well. Add dry ingredients, and stir until everything is mixed well. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto a greased baking sheet. Flatten out with a floured fork. Bake for 15 minutes in preheated 350° oven. Do not store until cold. Makes about 5 dozen cookies.

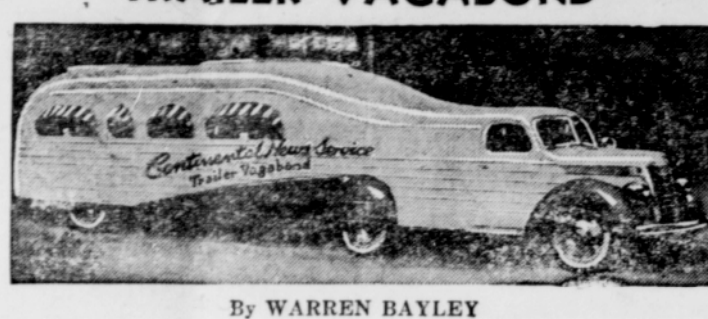
The Parent-Teacher club of the Sandy grade school are planning to give a moving picture show some time in April to aid in raising funds for the school's hot lunches.

WHITTIER, CALIF. — Your town should have a Trust Fund for the boys.

A few weeks ago I wrote a column about a new movement that is gaining considerable popularity throughout the country—the establishing of local Trust funds to assist our service men and women in their return to private life.

At that time I explained how the town of Stoneham, Mass., had led the way by starting a Service men's fund and was promoting a series of local civic entertainments to secure money for the Fund.

I also told of how four towns in California had recognized the merits of the plan and were starting Funds of their own, exclusively to help their own home town boys in their problems after the war. One of these towns has already started its drive. What it has accomplished to this date is of extreme importance to you and your town—large or small.

To begin with the entire population of our fighting forces. See Mrs. Seaman today and plan to give your share to this necessary service.

ject was sponsored by the local newspaper, Bill Fleetwood, the owner and publisher, and Doug Carlson, the editor, are determined that Whittier servicemen and women will not be kicked around this time as they did after World War I. They launched a publicity campaign in their paper to call the attention of the community to their problem and duty.

Their next step was to secure the cooperation of the town's financial institutions. A call on three banks and the local building and loan association produced quick results. Not only did all the institutions agree to act as depositories but the heads of all four agreed to act as Trustees of the Fund. The local theatre owner became the 5th trustee.

From a Los Angeles manufacturer the newspaper purchased 10,000 dime savings banks made of cardboard. These little banks are convenient to carry and hold about \$4 in dimes. The newspaper printed a front page story with a picture of the bank and explained to every citizen that one of these banks are going to be delivered to every home in Whittier and left there for 30 days. Every one was asked to save his dimes to start the fund.

The aid of the schools was enlisted and two weeks ago on Saturday, 100 girls from the high school took 100 banks each and went to work in a specified area. By nightfall every bank was in a home.

Within four days the banks started to come back—full. The mayor, chief of police, city clerk city treasurer, head of the parent teachers association, and the navy mothers' club plus dozens of others, issued statements urging the people to get behind the movement. The American Legion is staging a big affair to help to raise funds, the local theatre owner is holding a special show with all the proceeds to go to the Fund. Whittier is on fire with enthusiasm. At last something concrete has come out of all the conversation. They know there will be a need for such a fund and everyone is helping put it over.

In two more weeks the remaining banks will be picked up. They expect to raise \$15,000 by this grade school.

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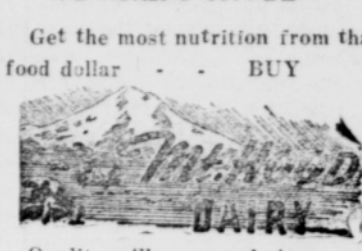
