ANSWERS TO MILITARY I. Q.

1. President Washington in 1794 led his troops for the suppression of the Whiskey Insurrection from the vicinity of Philadelphia to Bedford, Pa. President Roosevelt recently reviewed American soldiers in North Africa. President Lincoln was under fire at Fort Stevens in the defense of Washington, D. C. in July, 1864.
2. Insignia of the 28th (Yankee) Division composed of former National Guard units of the New England States.
3. General Stonewall Jackson's Confederate Infantry regiments, famed for their long and speedy marches, often exceeding 20 miles a day, were known as the "foot cavalry."
4. Carthage adjacent to the present city of Tunis.
5. General Joseph Warren, killed at the battle of Bunker Hill, June 17, 1775.
6. Atlas in Alutian Islands, Oran in Algeria, North Africa; Rabat in New Britain Island, and Casablanca, French Morocco.
7. Insignia of the Medical Corps.
8. False. General Washington had extraordinarily good intelligence service and sometimes provided spies with funds from his own purse.
9. The Order of the Purple Heart was instituted by General Washington in 1782. Only three awards were made until the Order was revived in 1932, but since that time thousands of American soldiers have been decorated with this medal.
10. General George A. Custer, Union cavalry commander, in the Fredericksburg campaign (1862), during a truce praised the fighting of Lieutenant Colonel John Pelham, Confederate artillery officer. They had been fellow cadets at West Point.

increases up to \$1800 per year, as the proficiency of that worker increases.
Men and women are needed for the following positions: aircraft electricians, aircraft engine mechanics, aircraft propeller mechanics, aircraft instrument mechanics, aircraft sheet-metal workers, aircraft welders, aircraft mach-

inests, and General Aero repairmen.

Physical qualifications are not too rigid—the loss of fingers or a foot even, is no bar to the applicants. Women must be over 16 years of age, and both boys and girls must either have finished high school, or not attending school at all. Men must be over 38 years of age or in a 4-F draft classification or boys 16 to 17 1/2 years of age are acceptable.

Workers will be employed at Army Air Corps depots or sub-depots.

and at the Green River. Hastings arrived at Fort Hall by the middle of August with seven wagons. Despairing of taking their remaining wagons any further, they left them at Fort Hall and continued to the Valley of the Willamette on horseback. They arrived at their trail's end in October in destitute circumstances, but they were gradually absorbed by the community for Oregon City was enjoying a boom and had become the metropolis of the North Pacific Coast.
