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LOCAL NEWS

War Farm News

CAMP AREA CROPS SAVED

Seventeen hundred acres of clover, alfalfa and volunteer vetch and grain hay are being salvaged from the Camp Adair contention area. Arrangements to harvest these needed forage crops were

worked out between the Polk county USDA War Board and the camp commandant. Most of the acreage is going to former owners who have moved to a farm in nearby areas.

MOLASSES FOR SILAGE

WPA restrictions on use of steel drums have been modified to provide for delivery of molasses to farmers for use in making silage. Any dealer may obtain a permit to fill any number of the drums that have previously contained molasses by requesting it from the Portland office of the War Production Board. By using this provision it eliminates the need for applications to WPB by individual farmers.

WHEAT LOAN RATE

Commodity Credit loan rate for Oregon's 1943 wheat crop will be \$1.32 a bushel, No. 2 soft white, Portland basis, being 11 cents higher than last year. Local rates for the entire state will be announced soon.

NO HARVEST FURLONGS

Clackamas county farmers are advised not to count on soldiers getting furloughs to help with the harvest. Because special furlough would disrupt the intensified training program, the army will not grant harvest furloughs for any 'extended' period. In emergency cases, however, 'passes' can be issued to permit soldiers to engage in farm work in the areas near army camps. County USDA Boards can supply information on this procedure and on methods for obtaining release of men from the army for returning to farm jobs.

WHEAT SUPPLY SITUATION

A report received by the county USDA War Board shows that the wheat supply situation as of June 1 was as follows: About 900 million bushels of the total 1.6 billion bushel domestic supply has been used, with about one-third of the disappearance going for livestock feed or for industrial alcohol. Commodity Credit owns approximately half of the remaining 700 million bushel supply. Another million bushels will probably be used before July 1, leaving a carry-over of 600 million bushels. Added to an expected 1943 crop of 700 million bushels, this will make a 1943-44 domestic supply of 1.3 billion bushels.

FARM SUPPLIES EASIER

Clackamas county farmers will find most types of farm supply buying a great deal easier as a result of a new program just put into operation by the War Production Board. Eliminating complicated forms and priorities, the new regulations provide that a farmer may purchase any of 144 commonly used items by certifying to the dealer that he is a farmer and that the item is needed for operation of the farm. If the dealer has the item in stock,

he must sell it. A simple certification may be used to purchase up to \$25 worth of any one of the 144 items included. For purchases above \$25, the buyer must obtain approval of the county Farm Rationing Board. In turn, county dealers will find supplies easier to get from their wholesalers. Dealers may apply an AA-5 rating to replace items sold on the farmer certification. Dealers who are low in stock may obtain a normal month's inventory of farm supplies from the wholesaler.

MEAT COMMITTEE NAMED

Organization of Clackamas Co., War Meat Committee is rapidly being completed by the county USDA War Board. As instructed by the War Food Administration, the committee will give immediate attention to an educational program designed to make every citizen an "anti-black" market detective.

JUNE CROP REPORT

Department of Agriculture's June crop report, received this week, shows that national crop conditions are less favorable than a month ago. While total acreage is as great as last year, the report indicates that there is no chance for a repetition of the 1942 bumper yields. An indicated 730 million bushel wheat crop will be one per cent below the 10-yr. average. Pasture and hay prospects are favorable, and the supply of hay per unit of livestock likely to be about normal. Our western range conditions are reported about the same as the 20-year average, 15 million acres of corn yet to be planted will need favorable weather to mature. A barley and oat crop report looks for less than last year but considerably above the ten-year average. May milk output of 11.9 million pounds is 2% under a year ago, but the late spring retarded production and the peak is expected 10 days later than usual. Our nation's hens and pullets laid 61.2 billion eggs in May, 13% above a year ago and bettering the 10-year average by 37 per cent.

MEAT PRICE ROLL-BACK

Announced coming roll-back in retail meat prices will not effect prices to the farm producer. Retail price reductions averaging 10% become effective June 21 for all meats except cured and processed pork. Prices for the latter will be rolled back July 5. Subsidies for slaughterers, packers and all wholesalers, permits the action to be taken "without imposing its effects on the farm producer" according to OPA.

FOOD FRONT BRIEFS

OWI reports that, on the average consumers are now paying \$1.40 for food which cost \$1 in the years 1935-39. — Pork production is now 16% greater than in 1942 — Stocks of rationed foods, plus production in sight, probably
