Game Commission
Gives Regulations
For '43 Hunting

The following regulations governing taking of game birds, game animals and furbearing animals were tentatively formulated by the Oregon State Game Commission at its meeting in Portland on Saturday, June 12. Adjournment was called until the 28th of June, at which time the final regulations will be formally adopted. This will enable the Commission to give publicity to the proposed regulations and provide an opportunity to hear any objections before final action is taken.

DEER AND ELK

GENERAL SEASONS

October 1 to November 3, open season for mule deer and black-tail deer having forked horns, entire state except as otherwise listed.

October 1 to November 3, open season for whitetail deer in Douglas county only.

October 26 to November 30, open season for bull elk having antlers, in entire state, except state parks, game reserves left closed, etc. Bag limit one bull elk except that in specified area in south central and south eastern Oregon, bag limit is one elk of either sex.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS

Special deer tags will be issued as follows:

1,000 antlerless deer tags for Steens Mountain area.

2,500 antlerless deer tags in that part of Grant county north of highway between Dayville and Canyon City.

6,000 antlerless deer tags in specified area in Lake and Klamath counties.

400 antlerless deer tags and 225 buck deer tags for the Hart Mountain Refuge during the special season from October 9 to 24, inclusive.

Fee: \$3.50 for residents and \$5 for nonresidents.

Special cow elk tags will be issued as follows:

2,000 antlerless elk tags for northeastern Oregon in the Wenaha-Minam-North Powder area.

Fee: \$5 for residents and \$25 for nonresidents.

Wherever special tags are required for deer and elk, this procedure is to be followed. Applications will be accepted immediately and if by August 15 more applications have been received for either elk or deer than the number of tags allowed, then a drawing will be held to determine the issue. If less applications than the allotted number are filed by August 15, then tags will be issued for all applications on hand and after that date applications will be filled in the order received until the supply of tags is exhausted.

In sending in his application to the Game Commission office a person should forward the specified fee and information as to the number and kind of his hunting license, the doe deer or cow elk area in which he wishes to hunt, and his name and address.

A person may apply for only one doe tag and may not put in applications for all the areas for which doe deer tags are to be issued. However, this does not apply to the Hart Mountain area, tags for which may be applied in addition to the others.

ANTELOPE

Open season September 18 to October 3 in specified portions of Lake, Harney and Malheur counties. Number of tags to be issued limited to 2,500.

Fee: \$2.50 for residents and \$5 for nonresidents.

Replied Secretary Morgenthau: "General, the American public will take care of that. What they have done in the Second War Loan drive—the money they have produced and the spirit they have shown—is proof enough for me that they will not let our fighters suffer from lack of support until we achieve complete victory, no matter how long that may be nor how much it may cost."

War-time Baking Hints

IT'S patriotic to serve cakes, cookies and pies because they're good for morale. But it ceases to be patriotic unless every batch of pastry turns out a complete success. And since war-time pastries are new, and not substitutes, here's hoping these hints will keep you, as they have me, from wasting precious ingredients.

These are the six important steps in making a perfect war-time cake: (1) find a recipe you can trust—one that's been tried and tested to meet war-time food-buying conditions; (2) Use good ingredients; (3) Measure accurately, and always sift flour once before measuring; (4) Mix carefully—and beat only until ingredients are thoroughly blended and batter is smooth; overbeating flour coarsens a cake; (5) Bake correctly in a preheated oven; (6) Treat your cake right after it's baked—when it comes from the oven, run a knife

around edge of cake pan, and invert pan on cake rack for about five minutes; then remove cake from pan and let it finish cooling right side up.

About pies! Don't be surprised if recipes for suet pie crust call for a little more water than crust made of vegetable shortening or lard, but don't use too much. Mix flour and suet until dough resembles corn meal before adding water. Never mind if dough looks tough while baking—when cool, it will be crisp and flaky.

* Deep Dish Rhubarb Pie

* Deep Dish Rhubarb Pie Recipe

4 cups rhubarb, cut in 1/4 inch lengths

8 tbsp. sugar

8 tbsp. flour

Mix rhubarb, sugar, honey, and tapioca or flour together. Pour into 9-inch pie pan lined with pastry. Dot with butter. Cover with pastry which has openings cut in it. Bake in preheated 425° oven for 45 minutes.

Suet Pastry Recipe

1 cup all-purpose

1/4 cup rendered

1/2 teaspoon salt

Blend flour, suet and salt together until consistency of corn meal. Add water and work until it forms a smooth dough.
