War Farm News

ALFALFA CEILING PRICES

Alfalfa hay has been brought under price control in five more states. Uniform OPA ceilings now cover this important crop—needed for fodder in the wartime drive for more milk—Washington, Oregon, California, Utah, Nevada, Arizona, Idaho and New Mexico. Base price is \$20 a ton, in the stack on the farm, for ungraded hay. Prices on graded hay certified by Federal or State hay inspectors range between \$17 a ton for No. 3 and \$25.50 for extra leafy No. 1. Charges for transportation are a dealer mark-up of \$1.50 a ton, a retailer mark-up of \$5 a ton and baling costs of \$4 a ton may be added where they apply.

FEED WHEAT PROGRAM

The rate at which the 50 million bushel allocation of feed wheat is disappearing resulted in modification of the Commodity Credit feed wheat program. Discontinued were sales of Government wheat stored in Commodity Credit portable bins, and also a program permitting producers to redeem farm stored wheat at the feed wheat prices. Until the 50 million bushels are exhausted, sales will continue of feed wheat shipped into the county, and the county AAA committees may continue to sell wheat from lots in storage earmarked for feed. Price until further notice, will be one cent a bushel higher than

1944 FOOD PLANS

Total planned acreage for the nation for 1944 will be considerably greater than this year, Oregon farm leaders reported on their return from a regional conference in Denver on the 1944 food production program. Big increases over 1943 will probably be needed for dry edible beans and peas, flaxseed, potatoes, soybeans, and a program will be announced soon, in ample time for Oregon farmers to make fall planting plans.

RACC LOAN PROGRAM

LOOK Lady

with JOSEPHINE HUDDLESTON

Like newly fallen snow against a blue sky or white eggs in a blue-lined box, white shirts, sheets, towels and tablecloths also, depend largely upon the adroit use of blue for their sparkling whiteness. Scientists at the American Institute of Laundering explain this seeming color magic by reminding us that the whitest of cotton cloth is only seventy-six per cent of the ideal whiteness of newly fallen snow against a blue sky. To our inexperienced eye, new sheets or shirts appear "snowy" white just as the blooming cotton from which they are made appears to be snowy white in the field. Actually, however, these cotton fibers are tinged with yellow.

Cloth manufacturers reduce this natural yellow by bleaching until our inexperienced eye accepts new material as pure white. Nonetheless, the yellow color is there and must be further "killed" by the expert use of bluing.

When these apparently "white as snow" shirts or sheets get into the home, another problem arises which even the scientific use of bluing can't solve all by itself. And that problem has to do with alkalies which tend to deaden the color of most blues and so reduces their ability to "kill" yellow.

Most of us have had more experience than we like to admit with that dreaded "ring around the tub" formed by soap and hard water. We're equally aware of the countless rinsings which still fail to eliminate all hard water soap curds.

Even in laundries where only rain-soft water is used, some soap still is present in the fifth rinse water. To eliminate this, laundries use a special preparation in the last rinse water before adding bluing. This preparation is called a "sour" and it neutralizes alkalinity, making it possible for the bluing to do a real job of whitening your shirts and sheets.

All of which leads us right back to where we started from—that whether it's eggs in a blue-lined box, snow against a blue sky, or shirts in an expert bluing bath, it's the color blue that makes white things whiter.
