The week of August 15th has been designated by the Old Oregon Trail Centennial Commission as Historical Exhibit Week thru-out the state. During that week the various towns and cities in the state are asked to display their historical relics in prominent store windows, that they may be seen by the greatest number.

Oregon has a great wealth of pioneer relics, most of which are hidden away in attics and cellars. It is proposed to bring them out of hiding and use them for a visual education in history and tradition.

This display will coincide with the time of the National Convention of the American Pioneer Trails Association which meets in Portland, August 19-21.

Oregon Pioneer relics should remain in Oregon and wherever possible, museums should be established for the permanent care and exhibition of these articles linking us to a heroic past.

As a visual education for our rising generation, our relics of pioneer days have a definite value. As a bookman would say, they are out of print, and their value rises accordingly.

Rationing Calendar

(Clip and keep for reference)

RATION BOOK No. 2
July 31 — Expiration date for red stamps P, Q, R and S (meats fats). Red stamp T becomes valid July 25; U on August 1; V on August 8; and W on August 15 — all expire August 31. Each weekly series good for 16 points.
August 7 — Expiration date for blue stamps N, P, and Q (processed foods) all of which became valid July 1. Blue stamps R, S, and T will be valid from August 1 through September 7.

RATION BOOK No. 1
SUGAR August 15 — Sugar stamp No. 13, good for five pounds expires. October 31 — Canning sugar stamps No. 15, 16, each good for five pounds, expire.
COFFEE August 31 — Stamp No. 22, good for one pound, expires. July 21 expiration date for coffee stamp No. 21.
SHOES October 31 — Stamp No. 18, good for one pair of shoes through this date.

FUEL OIL
September 30 — Period 5 coupons valid March 26 through September 30. Heating coupons, one unit, value ten gallons, ten units value 100 gallons.

GASOLINE
September 21 — No. 7 stamps in new A book, each good for 4 gallons, valid through this date. July 21 expiration date of old A mileage ration books and No. 6 stamps — renewal forms, available at service stations and ration boards.

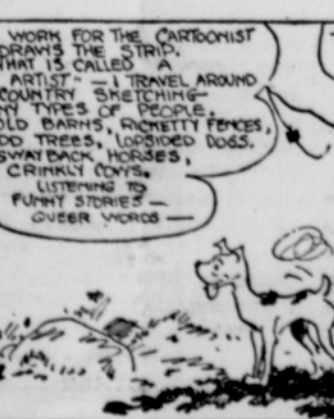
TIRES
Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every three months; B books every four months; A books every six months. September 30 next inspection deadline for A book holders.

"This indicates that on the average farmers are meeting this year's production goals for field crops established last winter — Since the production goals for crops and livestock were the basis of food management plans for the year, today's report bears out earlier forecasts that we will have enough food in this country — given at least average weather for the rest of the year — to give civilians adequate and healthful diets, in addition to meeting military and other essential requirements."

from county to county seasonal farm workers who follow the harvest will not effect the worker's eligibility for Selective Service deferment so long as he stays in essential farm work and keeps his local draft board informed — Acting to facilitate the marketing of large lamb crops, the War Food Administration has increased lamb and mutton quotas for commercial slaughterers (federal inspected plants in Oregon, California and Washington) to 100% of deliveries for civilian use during the third quarter of 1941 — Soldiers from Camp Adair have been using week-end leaves to help pick the Willamette cherry crop.
