land, who accompanied his father, J. Dean Butler of Oregon City, who is Clackamas County Chairman of the Old Oregon Trail Centennial, divided honors as speaker of the day with Walter Meacham of Portland. Mr. Butler first gave an interesting resume of those who preceded our immediate pioneer ancestors, saying that the American Indian came from Asia, the cradle of civilization, migrating by way of the Alutians into North America, then spread in waves down the western coast to Mexico and east over the continent. He stated that the Indians had a jargon used among the tribes before the

white men came. Later the English and the French added to the jargon universally used. The traders and missionaries, as a rule, preceded the settlers. Man-kind, he stated, must go forward and use its mistakes as a guide to the future. Pioneers came because they wanted to advance. He emphasized that this locality was rich in pioneer lore and one of the solid spots for keeping tradition alive, and advocated a county-wide program to unify records.

Walter Meacham, executive secretary of the Oregon Pioneer Centennial, led a party of Mazamas over the Old Oregon Trail between Oregon City and Sandy, arriving in time for the picnic dinner at noon. In his account of the founding of the provincial government at Champoug in 1843 Mr. Meacham said this handful of men were no pikers. They claimed for Old Oregon everything west of the Rockies, forming four counties, Wasco county then extending clear to the Rocky mountains and they granted a franchise to run a ferry on the Green River in what is now Wyoming. This government served their purpose, but was not recognized by Congress until 1848. He remarked that 102 settlers were present at Champoug when this event took place and the coincidence that the same number of 102 persons, on the Mayflower formed the compact that was to govern the Pilgrim colony. He said it irked him to see pioneers of early days depicted as old men and women. For they were young folks, strong and viril and determined.

In the erection of a pioneer monument at Sandy, Meacham advised not to wait for anything colossal, but gather rocks on the river for a pyramid and get a mason to build it. The suggestion was made that pioneer family names, with date of arrival, could then be inscribed later. Mr. Meacham paid a glowing tribute to the pioneer mothers in an original poem, "Little Mother of the Golden West." He said this would still be a fur-bearing country if it had not been for the pioneer women.

Mrs. Cecilia Johnson Oliver of South Bend, Washington, gave an account of her mother, Jane Howard, who had been kidnapped when a child of 7 years. She was brought west, and the Revenues took her in and raised her as their own. Later, she located her people on Sauvie's Island. This account was written by Myra Ann Hornacker.

Mable Wheeler Bramhall, who had a grandfather that settled on Sandy Ridge nearly 70 years ago, read an original poem, "The Sandy Pioneer."

Chitwood and Pleas Rourke, all past Kings, Comphret Shatterly, who was Queen elect for this year, and the following members of the Society, W. J. Hickey, Francis Koessel, C. Z. Lake, Ella T. Aschoff, Eva I. Bramhall Joseph H. Black, and Herman Bruns. Cass Garrigus acted as chaplain in place of Rev. A. B. Calder who could not attend because of illness.

At the business session of the Society, it was voted to establish a museum of pioneer relics at Sandy, with the following committee in charge: Mrs. Robert Jonsrud, Harry Bramhall, and M. V. Thomas with the Society president, Ed F. Bruns offering his assistance. An appeal was made by the historian for cooperation in locating relics and pioneer lore of this vicinity that should be revealed and recorded, both for present interest and for the benefit of future generations.

An exhibit is being planned for the week beginning August 15th in keeping with the Oregon Pioneer Centennial.
